President Truman spoke over the radio why he has called the Congress of the United States be special session on November Seventeenth:

the purpose of this special session, to draft a double barreled legislative program to xi fight high prices at home, and to save the hungry peoples of Tx France and Italy from what the President termed "totalitarian aggression."

The keynote of the presidential speech, that "inflation must be stopped before it is too late" Mr. Truman said that U S economy is basically sound, having been immensely strengthened in recent jears. He pointed out that the average buying power of the American people today is forty percent higher than in Nineteen Twenty-nine; but he warned we are losing some of this gain as sharply rising prices pull away x= Ex from income -- the moderate incomes of millions of families, already the victims of inflation. The President spoke of these families using up their savings, mortgaging an their future, by going into daby.

debt, doing without the things they should have.

by the threat of inflation" said to Trum, "and the peace of the world is endangered by hunger and cold in other lands." He described legislation by Congress as essential, the rest need too pressing to wait until the next regular session in January.

Leading up to his program for dealing with inflation, the President during declared that when so many people are not sharing fairly in PRESE prosperity, the road is being paved for a recession or a depression. When Congress meets, he intends to recommend measures to cope with high prices and high cost of living, insisting that "adequate measures - enacted in time -- are necessary to correct the situation. The President went on to speak of the plight of

France and Italy - both nationsfacing the coming winter

months without enough dollars to pay for the food and fuel
they need to survive. He pointed out that the dollars

appropriated by Congress for foreign relief could not feed

Burope if there was no food for the dollar to buy. "A

period of crisis is at hand," he warned. "The perils of
hunger and cold in Europe make this winter a decisive time
in history. With all the progress of reconstruction and
all the promise of future plans endangered."

The President didn't reveal just what legislation he'll ask of Congress, but he promised his program will be an all - out attempt to check inflation, high prices and the high cost of living.

The Soviets have added another name to their list of American war mongers - Governor Dewey of New York. This time the namer-of-names was the U.N.

Representative of the Soviet Ukraine, Manuilsky. Before the General Assembly of the United Nations he, today, repeated the castigation of other American war-mongers previously mentioned, and made that addition - Tom Dewey.

So now some comic writer might add another verse to the song, naming the American war mongers. With the Soviet refrain, "I've got a little list, I've got them on my lix list."

The anti-American propaganda campaign conducted by the Soviets was assailed today by one of

the American delegates to the U.N. - Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt The wife of the late President was selected to make a reply. She pointed out that Russian Press and redicare meter the statet control of the Soviet Covenments whe which makes what they say official Mrs. Roosevelt declared the Moscow villification of the United States has become what she called - serious. And she gave an ironical picture of the kind of talk that is used against us. "We are", said she, "bombarded with propaganda that the matks United States is dominated by Wall Street. supporting monarcho-fascists, imperialists, cartelists, dollar worshippers and fed feudalists. " Twell, those are hard names - especially monarcho fascists and cartelists.

The Soviet blast today included such matters as the loyalty checks now going on among employees of the State Department. The Soviet spokesman mentioned reced race discrimination, and climaxed with the Congressional investigation of the Hollywood Communists. He shouted that the hearing of the case against the movieland Reds was persecution. He same persecuting

people who, in his words, "dare to say one friendly word about the Soviet Union." What kind of freedom was that? Le demanded. To which the cohe might have responded the freedom to expense the enemies of freedom.

In Washington, the investigation of
Hollywood Communism today featured Walt Disney, of Mickey
Nouse fame, and Mrs. Lela Rogers, mother of Ginger Rogers,
one of the most resplendent of the glamor girls of the
screen. Both Walt Disney, and Mrs. Rogers, who is a long
time worker in the filmland, agreed in declaring that the
Hollywood Communists are a small, disciplined minerity,
with a determined plan for injecting the Red party line
into mux our motion pictures - though they don't often
succeed.

The most dramatic testimony was given

by Carlson, investigator of totalitarianism, who
in the past made headlines with exposes of Nazi scheming
in this country. He has been doing the same job on

Communism, Acc., and today told a story of a top Communist
leader sent out to Hollywood to direct the Red penetration
of the movies.

Ely Jacobson, a charter member of the American Communist Party, a former director of the Workers' school in New York, and at one time instructor in the University of Moscow. Ely fach Jacobson was sent by the central committee of the Communist Party. Oliver Carlson stated today that back in those days, the Thirties, the Hollywood smart-set adopted a slogan, "It's smart to be a Red." He added that in movieland Ely Jacobson collaborated with a prominent editor and writer of one of our big national magazines.

Carlson told how, eventually, he had a talk with Jacobson, who said he was turning against the whole Red husiness." He told me, "testified Carlson today, "that the he decided to break with the Communist Party. He was terribly agitated, was afraid he was going to be g killed. Later," added Carlson; "He disappeared from Los Angeles, and I don't know to this day whether he is dead or alive."

From Moscow we have the ugly word hostages. That's a word with a sinister ring in the
history of Red revolution. So who now wrath are the
Soviets holding as hostages? The Brazilian diplomats
who represented their country in Moscow until the
diplomatic break the other day between the biggest of
the American Republics and Soviet Russia.

The Moscow radio reported tonight that the former Braziliar Ambassador and his staff were being held as hostages for the safety of the Soviet Embassy staff at Rio. Moscow declares that Brazilians have been making attacks on the Soviet Ambassador with stones and rotten eggs. Soviet diplomats and their families have been targets of such assaults, with Brazilian government accused of encouraging the rocky and odoriferous barrage.

Nations today, a News Moscow spokesman declaring that the Soviet Embassy in Rio was being thus assailed by what he called hooligans. He added: "Brazilian police on attacles from duty at the Embassy encourage, these hooligans, attacles."

From London we have sad news about the party of eight M.P.'s that went to Soviet Russia to have an interview with Stalin. Three have come back bruised and battered. Fight labor party members of Parliament journeyed to have a talk with the Generalissimo £x of the Reds, and find out what the Soviets were up to. One returns with a bandaged hand, another with a bandaged leg, while a third comes home on crutches.

The major mishap occurred to Ben Parkin, M.P. - though not the most serious physically. He slipped on Stalin's rug. It must have been an astonishing thing to behold, virtually an international incident. The Labor members of Parliament visited Stalin at his summer place in the Caucasus, overlooking the Black Sea. The floor of the guest house, where they put up, has a rug, and you know what a treacherous instrument of death and disaster a rug can be - on a slippery floor. Ben Parkin, M.P. stepped on that Stalin rug, and - zing, the rug slipped, his feet went up, and he landed on his neck. He was lucky that he didn't break his leg. As it was, his

hand took the brunt of the calamity so badly bruised and bent that Soviet medical attention was necessary.

So when the party of M.P.'s was admitted into the presence of Stalin, Ben Parkin had his hand in a big bandage. What did Stalin say? That's what irks Ben Parkin, M.P. Today he said that Stalin, seeing the bandaged hand, made no comment whatever. "So," reasons Ben Parkin M.P. "There must be lots of his visitors who slip on that blasted rug."

Well, we wouldn't want to accuse Stalin of planting that rug for the downfall of his house guests although many who have a lot of guests, might be trans tempted to some such strategem. I don't want to suggest any ideas, but a nice tricky rug on a slippery floor, might do one's heart a lot of good when some of those guests go stumping around your place. The ideal thing would be to have a peep-hole through which you could watch, when runthing knap something happens like what happened to Ben Parkin M.P. when he visited Stalin. However, I don't suppose that Stalin has any peep-hole

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in connection with his trick rug.

mishaps of a different kird. The one with the bandaged leg came to grief when he played in a soccor game with Soviet football kickers. Arthur Allen, M.P. fancies himself quite an athlete and he tried to show the Soviets how the good old association game was played in England. I don't suppose there was anything political about it, but the M.P. got roughed up a bit in a friendly proletarian way. The fact that he comes home with a bandaged leg might indicate that he got a Marxian kick in the leg.

REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE

From Columbus, Ohio Senator Robert A. Taft announces himself as a candidate for the Nineteen Forty-Eight Republican presidential nomination. Taft told the press conference that he will not take an active part, but, he "might" seek delegates to the National Convention at the preferential primaries.

He says he has no intention of entering the Oregon or Wisconsin primaries, but that the Taft Compaign Committee may find it desirable to enter the primaries in some states in which there are no active contests.

The Ohio Senator avoided all questions on the strength of presidential condidates and wouldn't say whether he had discusses a possibility of a Taft-Stassen ticket with the former Governor of Minnesota. In short, the only thing he would admit was that he has tossed his hat in the ring for the presidential nomination.

In Maine, fashionable Bar Harbor is a scene of ruin and desolation. ## PLANE CRASH

He kept in radio communication to the last minute -- flashing a series of messages which told how fire had broken out in the rear of the plane, and the tail was burning off. Pilot E.L.

McMillan said he was trying for an emergency landing on an air strip near Bryce Canyon. Thought he might make it.

He almost did; the plane crashing within a mile of the air strip. Fifty-two Killed.

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tricks with the weather, and doing things to the oxygen of the air. Which affects the health, the temperament, and the conduct of us human beings.

The Chicago scientist, who has made a study of sun spots i with relation to human history, discloses a whole series of coincidences - dramatic historical events occurring at times when solar activity was at a maximum. Our American Revolutionary War - and The: then later the French Revolution occurred when the face of the heavenly orb developed a lot of freckles. The. same with the opium war in the far east, and there was a rash of sun spots in Nineteen Fourteen, when the First World War broke out. The next big sun spot period coincided with the stock market crash, the beginning of the be depression; - also the rise of Hitler. The last cosmic disturbance was eight years ago - and World War Two broke out.

So now we're moving into another cycle

of sun spots - which will according to scientific forecast

be the greatest since the American Revolution. So what k

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have we to expect? New turmoil, some new dramatic events in history?
