Good evening everybody.

The government of Cambodia today granted political asylum - to those two Americans who hijacked the freighter Columbia Eagle. The U.S. State Department was also informed that Cambodia was taking over the ship itself complete with its cargo of bombs which were originally destined for Thailand.

For what its worth, the two hijackers were earlier described by fellow seamen - as a couple of "pill-popping marijuana blowing" hippies - who were always "talking about how they were anti-Vietnam."

## PHNOM PENG

A related item - from Phnom Pent; where the
government of Cambodia opened talks today - with Diet Cong
and North Vietnamese diplomats. Subject: The presence
of Communist troops - in this "neutral" nation. The

Cambodians reportedly telling the Communists bluntly -
they must go. A demand that was underscored by renewed anti-Communist Phertoday in Phenom Pent - even as the meting was taking place.

In Washington - a text of the recent testimony before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee - by Secretary of State Rogers was made public for the first time today. On the subject of Laos - the Secretary said the U.S. has no plans at present for using ground forces in that jungle kingdom - even "if it is overrun" by Communist forces.

## AGNEW FOLLOW SENATE

At the same time, the Administration made it plain
today - it has no intention of stopping U.S. bombing runs against Communist troops operating in Laos. Vice President Spiro Agnew asserting that such a move - would be "to prostrate ourselves on the altar of sacrifice to satisfy Administration critics; whose op onions" -
he added - "seem to concur with the opinions of the enemy."

In Vietnam - a U.S. Navy reconnaissance plane crashed
and burned today - at Da Sang air base. Casualties
including twenty-two dead, eleven injured - in one of worst non-combat air disasters of the war. U.S.
headquarters also reported the loss of three American
planes - in air operations over Laos.

On the political front - South Vietnam's National

Assembly approved today a sweeping land reform bill. One that's aimed at giving to peasants - the tenant farms which they have always tilled in the past for someone else.

The following day there was a parade from ingha Durbar Palace to King Mahendra's new royal palace. This time the Crown Princess and her hundreds of attendants brought presents to the Prince, to say "yes," she would marry him. Of course, all this had been agreed upon long before. They had been friends and agreed to do this many years before.

Still another day, mother parade. This time they spent
an entire night going through the ancient wedding ritual.

One-half million watched this parade and that's quite a crowd
for a country with only ten million inhabitants.

These parades were not quite so colorful and dramatic as the coronation ceremony fourteen years ago. Then the king had brought in three-hundred elephants, all in gorgeous trapping with many of us riding in silver and golden howdahs. $I$ wonder if we are seeing the end of the elephant: era, with the gasoline buggy taking over everywhere.? $\qquad$ y'
