President Johnson said today that General Westmoreland will get as many troops as he needs to fight the war in Vietnam. After two days of White House discussions with Westmoreland sther top officials, the President told newsmen -- "we have reached a meeting of the minds -- the troops that General Westmoretand needs and requests - and that we feel acceptable - will be supplied." When asked if the increase in xo troops would fully meet Westmoreland's request, the President replied -"The answer is yes." Westmoreland is reported to have asked for one hundred thousand more men. The President went on to say that the exact number of troops and the specific countries that partit supply them will be determined after Westmoreland returns to Vietnam. He emphasized that he could see no need to call up the reserves.

### BOMB

An Englishman - who describes himself as a deserter from the French Foreign Legion - says the French lost an atomic bomb in the Pacific last month while they were preparing to test it. Donald Taylor made this assertion in Auckland, New Zealand, where he arrived from Tahiti as a stowaway aboard a xox an ocean liner. He says the incident occurred on Mururoa Atoll when the atomic bomb -- suspended from a balloon -broke loose and fell into the sea, -+ two days before the bomb was to have detonated. "They lost it," Taylor, adding -says, "and it's probably floating around in the Pacific

somewhere."

#### HONG KONG

There's no let-up tonight in the violent demonstrations which have been rocking the British Crown Colony of Hong Kong all this week. Pro-Communist rioters -- inspired by pronouncements from Peking -- are throwing dynamite and firebombs from speeding automobiles. Police fighting back with tear-gas bombs and sawed-off shotguns. They chased about six hundred demonstrators through the streets near Nathan Road in Kowloon - the famed "Golden Mile" tourist stopping area. RAdding to Hong Kong's woes is a water shortage. Water rationing began and almost immediately led to violence. One man was killed and another seriously wounded in an argument over who was first in line at a public faucet.

### MIDEAST

The Arab countries - ridiculing Israeli claims of humanitarian **gan** gains from the annexation of Jerusalem have charged that American diplomatic and military aid made Israel's actions possible. The charges were made in the U N General Assembly which is debating new Pakistani resolution -- calling on Israel to heed a U N call to return the Old City of Jerusalem to Jordan.

## CONGO

The State Department says it understands the International Red Cross is "urgently investigating" the fate of white civilians who - for several days - were held as hostages by rebel forces at Kisangani in the Eastern Congo. Some of the twenty Americans known to have been in that area may have been among the hostages -- though this is not certain. Nor is there any confirmation of reports that the rebels -- led by white mercenaries took the hostages with them as they fled.

### TERROR

In Saigon, police report that Viet Cong terrorists

have assassinated an employee of an election Council

member -- apparently in an attempt to sabotage the South

Vietnamese presidential elections. The employee -- a

messenger -- was shot and killed by three men riding

a motor-bike, all occupets in that Saigon traffic.
