DUPONT AWARDS

Tonight I am in the handsome Rotunda of the Low Library at Columbia University. The occasion, the annual presenting of the famous Dupont Awards. To the world of broadcasting these are what the Pulitzer Awards are to newspaper journalism and the world of letters. Why am I here? I guess because, as many of you know, Raymond Gram Swing, H.V. Kaltenborn, Elmer Davis, Ed Murrow have all passed on. Of those who received the Dupont long ago I am the sole survivor. And, maybe I'm folding up and don't know it.

The Dupont Award originated in Nineteen-Forty-Two with a widow Elie Able, Dean of the renowned Columbia Graduate School of Journalism, Marvin Barrett, head of the Dupont Awards Group and many other notables - Senator Mark Hatfield of Oregon. Throughout the year people from

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coast to coast competant people watch for meritorious achievement in the domain of broadcasting. Then, Elie Abel and six distinguished jurors choose those to receive the awards. The awards they will be given in a few minutes As soon as I am off the air the presentations will be made to the fortunate nine. But so many were recommended this year that the jurors decided for the first time there should be eleven additional citations. The fortunate ones? Alas I haven't even time to read them to you. But I hope you do read all about them in your newspapers. ENERGY

Meanwhile, Dr. Kissinger was conferring today - with Algerian President Houari Boumedienne in Algiers; the first stop - on his current peace mission, to the Middle East Dr. Kissinger later saying only: "We had a full, frank and constructive discussion - on the Middle East and the question of bilateral relations."

WATERGATE

Adding, however, they have been unable as yet - to determine the cause of the hum that now fills the tape. They also note that "any speech that might have been recorded under the buzz -"probably will not be retrievable." WHITE HOUSE

From The White House, - an announcement today that President Nixon "welcome⁵ the examination" of his tax returns - as now planned by a joint Congressional committee. Deputy Press Secretary Gerald Warren saying the President "is confident - all doubts will be removed." Adding: "If the competent authorities find that the President does owe further taxes - he will pay them, of course." POPULARITY
