Kaltenborn, Elmer Davis, Ed Murrow have all passed on. Of those who received the Dupont long ago I am the sole survivor. And, maybe I'm folding up and don't know it.

The Dupont Award originated in Nineteen-Forty-Two with a widow Elis Able, Dean of the renowned Columbia Graduate School of Journalism, Marvin Barrett, head of the Dupont Awards Group and many other notables - Senator Mark Hatfield of Oregon. Throughout the year people from
coast to coast competant people watch for meritorious achievement in the domain of broadcasting. Then, Elie Abel and six distinguished jurors choose those to receive the awards. The awards they will be given in a few minutes As soon as I am off the air the presentations will be made to the fortunate nine. But so many were recommended this year that the jurors decided for the first time there should be eleven additional citations. The fortunate ones? Alas I haven't even time to read them to you. But I hope you do read all about them in your newspapers.
