GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

Do you hear that quiet cheering from one of the Florida Keys - Biscayne? That's the Nixons expressing pleasure over the latest from California.

A flood of absentee ballots late today swept

Vice President Richard M. Nixon well into the lead

for California's thirty two electoral votes. Kennedy

had led all the way in the tally of regular ballots,

ending with a majority of 34,568; and his election on

the Democratic ticket as the next President is not

jeopardized by the California swing. But his margin

has been reduced and Nixon's prestige in his home state

is strengthened.

The latest count, including the regular Movember 8th ballots and more than 170,000 absentees totaled thus far: Nixon 3,191,314; Kennedy 3,189,612.

All the state's 58 counties were represented in the absentee figures but many remained incomplete, and most of the large blocks remaining were in Republican counties. Los Angeles county, which still had about 34,000 to count today, was giving Nixon 63 per cent of the absentee vote.

President Eisenhower called today's news conference to talk about gold. The problem of American gold - flowing

President Eisenhower wants the figure reduced - to less than a quarter of a million.

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LATIN AMERICA

The fighting in Central America could erupt into - a war in the Caribbean. So says President Ydigoras of Guatemala, who charges that Cuba is behind the present rebellion against his government - and adds that he'll order an attack on Castro's island, if Castro's aggression continues.

Tonight the picture - looks like this. The Guatemalen army is mopping up the rebels - along the Honduran frontier, where Honduran army has sealed off its side of the frontier - to prevent the Guatemalan rebels from crossing. Nigaragua has smashed the revolt in Carazo Province - and is rounding up the last of the guerrillas. While Costa Rica is deporting some Nicaraguan exiles - for abusing their asylum, carrying on their conspiracy.

The hand of Castro - is seen in all this. But the Cuban dictator - still denies it.

The President of France is going to ask the people of France - for a mandate on Algeria. DeGaulle, to put his Algerian plan to the vote - early next year. He feels that he can't push for an "Algerian Algeria" - if there is any doubt about his authority. He wants to face the generals and settlers in Algeria - with both sides quite sure that he has the French nation behind him.

DeCaulle's problem is pointed up - by the case of
Pierre Lagaillarde. A leader of the anti-Gaullist movement
lest January - Lagaillarde tonight is free on bail. Before
leaving the Paris court, he testified that DeCaulle's program would result in a free Algeria within a year.

IDEOLOGY

That "Communist summit meeting" in Moscow - may be running into trouble, according to observers in Warsaw.

They point out that Poland's Gomulka is overdue - in the Polish capital. The obvious reason for Gomulka's prolonged absence - Khrushchev's desire to have all the Red satraps remain in Moscow until a joint communique can be hammered out. The fly in the ointment may be - the Chinese delegate emphatically defending the ideology of Red China. Offering more resistance to the idea of co-existence - than Khrushchev had bargained for.

GREENGLASS

The release of David Greenglass in New York - is reviving a lot of bitter memories. Greenglass made headlines in Nineteen Fifty-One -- when he confessed his part in a Soviet espionage ring. But the real point is - that he implicated his own sister and her husband. Ethel and Julius Rosenberg - who were executed in Nineteen Fifty-three.

Today Greenglass walked to his car - with his coat

collar pulled up He drove off - without saying a word.

Tonight a dark sinister shape is gliding smoothly through the depths of the Atlantic. Our atomic submarine, the "George Washington" - which is painted a dark purple to blend with the shadows near the floor of the ocean. The "George Washington" is armed with sixteen nuclear-tipped Polaris have a range of twelve hundred miles - enough to bring ninety per cent of Russia's major cities within striking distance. CHURCHILL

comfortably tonight. Sir Winston Churchill, who will be eighty-six at the end of this month -- fell in his London home. X-rays showed -- that he had broken a bone in his back. But Britain's Grand Old Man insisted on returning home - from his doctors. And tonight Lady Churchill told newsmen -- there's nothing to worry about. Sir Winston - in no danger. Growling about the fact in he'll be confined to his bed for a while.

What's the story? Oh, just that the lady and the clerk happened to be - in Leningrad. The Soviet Union is having a boom - a black market in American jazz. The music stores - officially selling only records approved by the Party. actually But selling an awful lot of the Dixieland beat - under the counter. Doing a thriving business in Henry Armstrong and Duke Ellington - instead of obeying Party discipline.

So you'll know where you are if a music salesman murmurs in a dulcet tone of voice - "We have some rock and boogie, darling." You'll know you're in - the Soviet Union.

Rock + boogie - not sall and woogit.

So the Maori warrior glared fiercely, and challenged the Princess - "Do you come in peace or war?" It must have been quite a spectacle - to Princess Margaret. The Queen's sister and her husband - visiting the New Zealand frigate "Otago" in the Thames. The "Otago" boasts among its crew - fourteen authentic New Zealanders. Then the Maori aboard the "Otago" broke into their deep, boaring rythmic chant of welcome - clapping their hands, and stomping on the deck. A royal welcome of a rather unusual kind - for a Princess accustomed to royal welcomes.

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
