SAN CLEMENTE

Defiance at San Clemente. President Nixon refusing today - to comply with Senate Watergate Committee subpoenas; refusing to meet the committee's demand - for some four hundred White House tapes and documents.

In a letter to Committee Chairman Sam Ervin - the

President saying: "To produce the material you now seek
will unquestionably destroy any vestige of confidentiality of

Presidential communications; thereby irreparably impairing

the Constitutional functions - of the office of the Presidency!"

The President adding that "neither the judiciary nor the Congress - could survive a similar power by the Executive Branch to rummage through their files." "Under the circumstances" - he concluded - "I can only view your subpoenas as an overt attempt to intrude into the Executive - to a degree that constitutes an unConstitutional usurpation of power."

WATERGATE

Committee Chairman Sam Ervin says the committee is on solid constitutional ground and will attempt to substantiate that in further court contests with the White House.

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Egyptian and Israeli peace envoys - met for fourth time today in Geneva. A later statement saying only:

"The parties examined technical models of disengagement."

Another meeting - set for Monday.

U.N. sources were quoted as saying, however, their could be an agreement on disengagement - in a week to ten days. An Israeli official adding that, indeed, two sides have already reached a broad agreement - on the withdrawal of opposing troops. But the final terms - said to depend on, quote, "Egyptian application of the cease-fire;" also, the "political decisions - as to how far forces should be moved."

SUEZ CANAL FOLLOW GENEVA

Meanwhile, a continuing series of clashes - along the Suez Canal. Egyptian and Israeli troops - exchanging tank, artillery, mortar and rocket fire; to the point where the Israeli press is now calling it - another war of attrition. A government spokesman further declared: "The war, in fact, is going on."

KISSINGER FOLLOW VIENNA

Here at home again - Secretary of State Henry

Kissinger conferred today with Israeli Defense Minister

Moshe Dayan. Their talks later described - as "very useful and positive." And they will meet again tomorrow.

On the energy front - a warning today that the U.S. is facing fuel shortages - that could last anywhere from ten to fifteen years. This - from energy czar William Simon; who said the crisis will be over - only when the U.S. has developed new oil sources - also, solar power and geothermal power. Simon going on to say: "We have been a nation of energy wastrels - and this day is over because the day of cheap energy is over."

VIENNA FOLLOW ENERGY

A related item from Vienna - headquarters of the
Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries. A spokesman
for said group - commenting on a report that President
Nixon will seek a global solution to the present oil shortage.
Abdul Kubbah saying: "We are always suspicious of moves
President Nixon makes - but if his proposals are
constructive, they will find a favorable response."

Kubbah also hinted that oil producing nations may join with consumer nations - in the search for an alternative energy source. "We don't want to strangle the economy of the West" - he said - "we only want a reasonable price for our oil as compared with other sources of energy."

UNEMPLOYMENT

The U.S. unemployment rate - was up again last month. Not much. From four-point-seven - to four-point-nine per cent. But this the second such increase - after a drop to the lowest jobless rate in nearly four years; due in part, at least - to the energy crisis. The economists telling us, what's more - the worst is maybe yet to come.

The new Daylight Saving Time law - is scheduled to take effect as of two o'clock Sunday morning. But three Western states - Arizona, Idaho and Oregon - today were granted exemptions at least for now; and a fourth - Kentucky - was granted permission to redraw its times zones - both Eastern and Central.

This - by order of Transportation Secretary Claude Lardship

Brinegar; in response to appeals from the governors of each of the four states involved.

Former Ohio Senator William Saxbe was officially sworn in today - as the Nixon Administration's fourth Attorney General. The blunt-speaking Republican later saying that over the past several years - Americans have "lost a great deal of respect of law." Stressing, however, that he remains - a firm "law and order man." Also, pledging to "bring credit to the law" - to leave the Justice Department "better than I have found it." Saxbe adding that unless laws are respected - there is "no way you can keep a society from drifting into anarchy."

Saxbe's old job in the Senate - will now be filled by Cleveland Democrat Howard Metzenbaum; who was sworn in earlier in the day - with Saxbe himself attending the ceremony.

Metzenbaum later observed that President Nixon - is not his "favorite President." Adding: "I might be even more outspoken - than my predicessor."

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An overnight storm that dumped up to six inches of snow on Southern California - was heading East today across Nevada, Arizona and Utah. The National Weather Service saying it could develop into a major winter blast - by the time it reaches the Plains States, probably Saturday night.

The temperatures there, by the way - remain extremely cold. At North Platte, Nebraska - twenty-one below; at nearby Lincoln - nineteen below.
