BEIRUT

Reported details of a new U.S. peace offensive in the Middle East - were disclosed for the first time today in Beirut. Lebanese sources are quoted as saying the U.S. is now urging - a three-month so-called "peace pause". This is to permit intensive diplomatic efforts - toward a permanent solution to the current Arab-Israeli impasse. It also suggests - that both sides withdraw at least twelve U.S. miles from the banks of the Suez Canal. The tplan, according to the Lebanese sources does not call for direct Arab-Israeli talks. Secretary of State Rogers will hold a news conference tomorrow morning. In the meantime - a related item from London; suggesting the Kremlin is having some serious second thoughts - dout the extent of its current involvement in the Middle East. The Russians are said by some East European sources to fear the possibility of a direct confrontation between the U.S. and Russia - arising from circumstances that neither might be able to control.

CAMBODIA

Half-a-world away - the man who headed that Allied offensive into Cambodia - today called the entire operation a "brilliant" maneuver, U.S. Major-General George Casey - asserted "it really changed the military balance here." He added that U.S. and South Vietnamese forces have seized more than a year's supply of Communist arms and equipment. He also said: "Our instructions are at this time to be out completely by June Thirtieth - and we have no plans at all for going back in." SENATE

In Washington, the Senate today repealed by a vote of eighty-one to ten - its controversial Nineteen-Sixty-Four Gulf of Tonkin Resolution. This - was - the measure requested by Lyndon Johnson that first authorized unlimited military intervention in Southeast Asia. However, President Nixon now says - he doesn't need it; and, in jact, today's revocation was initiated by a number of Republicans - acting with Administration approval.

Senator Fulbright, voted against repeal - even though he has long-criticized the Gulf of Tonkin Resolution - which he originally sponsored, incidentally. Fulbright contended that today's action - was a viblation of normal Senate procedure. In voting of to repeal - he added - he was

WASHINGTON

In response to President Nixon's economic report to the nation last week - Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, moved front and center today in Washington. Granted time to reply by NBC - Mansfield said that the U.S. is now in the throes of a dangerous slump. "Inflation, unemployment and war" - said Mansfield - these are the words that "spell recession."

The Senator added - that the President is permitting inflation to run rampant; while ignoring - said Mansfield the tools, such as credit controls, which Congress has already given him. Mansfield said: "For too long - we have pursued the nation's security all over the globe; for too long - we have forgotten that national security begins at home." RICHARDSON

Elsewhere in Washington - Elliott Richardson was officially sworn in today - as the new Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare; a job that so far has defied anybody to hold it - longer than two years. Richardson, nevertheless, pledged an all-out effort - to attain the Administration's goal " of better quality of life for all Americans."

Among those present - the man who appointed Richardson to his new job - President Nixon; who later said he had just learned - that the new Secretary was nicknamed "Lucky" during World War Two. "I can only say" - said the President - "he is lucky and we are lucky." Richardson himself observed: "I'm going to need a little bit of luck."
