London and Washington want to know more about this.

## ECONOMIC

America's economy has set a new record - for the first time since the steel strike. So reported by - the federal Reserve Board in Washington. Industrial output jumping - nearly three per cent. The reason - better sales of durable goods. Cars, household products, farm equipment, business machines and so on.

### ANTARCTIC

Two American ships have set a new record - for sailing South. The icebreakers "Glacier" and "Burton Island" - smashing through the pack ice of the Amundsen Sea. Getting closer to the South Pole - than any other ship. Uncle Sam's icebreakers now at anchor - surrounded by icebergs two miles long, and three hundred feet high - in the Antarctic Amundsen Sea.

Some speed skating records were broken here at Squaw Valley today - but unofficial. There was the usual complaints from hockey players who said they were crowded off the ice by the figure skaters. There were parking problems. But - on the whole everything is working out better than it has anywhere else at a winter olympics.

Fearful of an avalanche which might bury the men's downhill course, rangers of the U.S. forest service snow safety team made their way 9,000 feet to the top of Squaw Peak - highest point in the area, and blasted off a huge cornice in the dawn's early light.

The rangers perilously planted 200 Bangalore torpedoes in the cornice - a huge "wave" of snow curling over the edge of the peak - and blasted more than 100 tons of snow into the valley below. This ended the threat of an avalanche during the downhill competition coming upon Friday. I spent part of the day on the mountain with them.
