GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

One reason for Americans to give thanks tonight

- on the highways, fewer accidents. The average for

this Thanksgiving - for the nation - only four an hour.

No worse than any average November day.

But the Safety Council warns - that tomorrow will be more dangerous. As will be all the days - until Monday. Most families were off the highways - for Thanksgiving. Many on them again tomorrow - and over the weekend with the National Safety Council, predicting - four-hundred-and-fifty deaths by the end of the week. Take it easy. Let's prove that prediction wrong.

ROCKEFELLER

It must have been a sad Thanksgiving Day for the Nelson Rockefellers - both at home - and in New Guinea.

Newsmen travelling with the Governor, describe him - as pale, tired, haggard, close to despair. The Governor of New York, an anguished father - who feels that his son could be only a few miles away. But, in New Guinea, a few miles means - swamps and jungle of what has been called "the worst terrain on earth."

Governor Rockefeller clings to hope. Nevertheless hour by hour the belief grows - that if the young anthropologist were alive, some trace of him would have been found by now.

The last faint chance - is that Michael may be in a primitive new Guinea village. Possibly being taken care of - by the natives. A slim chance that no one but his father - is willing to bet on. And even

SCANDINAVIA

The unemotional people of Scandinavia - are disturbed tonight. Worried about - the intentions of the Soviet Union. Khrushchev's power play - aimed at the Nordic nations.

Most concerned - Finland. President Kekkonen is in Siberia, conferring with Khrushchev - while Helsinki wonders what the boss of the Kremlin is demanding. The great fear is - that he may want Soviet bases in Finland. In any case, Khrushchev is treating Kekkonen - rather contemptuously. Forcing the Finnish President to make the long journey to Siberia - instead of meeting him in Moscow. Marker Moreover, Levent Khrushchev didn't bother to go to the Novosibirsk airport - when Kekkonen landed.

As far Norway and Sweden? The Soviet pressure - is on them, too. Both are trying to fend off Khrushchev's accusation - that they are helping West Germany prepare for another war against Russia.

No wonder Scandinavia is disturbed. Khrushchev acting too much - like Stalin in Nineteen Thirty-Nine.

The American military train that was held up in

East Germany for fifteen hours - may have been the victim of
a put-up job. Reason for the delay - a German who slipped
aboard. The Russians, holding the train - until the intruder
was turned over to them. Which they had a right to do under the fur four power agreements on Berlin.

Our authorities in West Germany believe - that
the man may have been a Communist agent. Ordered by the Reds
to be on the train - so they'd have a reason to stop it.

Tonight, tighter security precuations are being taken - with
the rest of our trains to West Berlin.

TRIAL

The verdict in Moscow today - was a foregone conclusion. No one thought for a moment the Mussians would hold such a trial - without deciding in advance to have a verdict of "guilty." So it comes as no surprise, to find those West Germans - receiving a long prison sentence. Peter Sonntag and Walter Naumann - convicted of spying for America; given twelve years by the Soviet Judge.

The verdict in Washington is that this was another trumped up Moscow trial. The kind at which the Mussians have excelled - ever since Stalin showed them how to do it.

The jet liner that crashed sixty miles from

Sac Paulo, Brazil - was enroute from Buenos Aires to New

York. Making a scheduled stop - at Campinas. Everything
routine, the pilot, apparently in control of the plane
when he took off at dawn into a driving rain.

The "Comet" became airborne - for just over a minute. Reaching an altitude of less than three hundred feet.

Only about two hundred-yards - beyond-the end of the airstrip,

Some witnesses was that the jet liner - burst into flames. On Others, that the fire erupted - after the crash.

Whatever the truth the big plane hit with a roar, that was heard for miles around. It skidded through am
eucalyptus grove - and smashed into a rock cliff with a
tremendous impact. Then - torn apart by an explosion.

No survivors - among the fifty-two on board.

The Kennedy clan is gathered in Hyannisport tonight;

- and I do mean - "clan": Twenty eeven members of the famous

family - recuperating after a typical Kennedy Thanksgiving.

Place - the home of the President's father, on Cape Cod.

Thirteen Kennedy adults, arriving with - fifteen youngsters.

Five guests, raising the total to - thirty-three for dinner.

A holiday for the President - but tomorrow will be a working day. Secretary of Defense McNamara and a planeload of officials, due in Hyannisport from Washington - for consultations with Mr. Kennedy.

The satellite story we had last night - ordinarily would have a fixe follow up tonight. A description of size; orbit, purpose - and so on. There's no follow-up tonight-because the Air Force refuses to say anything.

The launching of the satellite was visible - for miles around Point Arguello, California. Thousands of observers, watching - as the Atlas booster arched into the sky with its payload. The shoot - appeared successful. But the Air Force won't even tell us - whether it was or not.

Much less - what's in the capsule.

TORNADOES

The tornado story tonight - concerns Florida.

A string of twisters - smashing into the Northern Panhandle of the sunshine state. Hardest hit - Gadsden County. One tornado, swirled through the farm area near Quincy - knocking over farm buildings, and killing libestock.

Destroying seven barns - full of tobacco corp.

Florida tornadoes as destructive as Texas twisters:

A newspaper shipment has reached its destination in Ohio - after taking the long way around. Arriving by way of the Soviet Union.

Point of origin - Sidney, Ohio, address - Russia, Chio. The address, explaining what happened - although how it happened isn't clear. The Post Office, sending the package marked "Russia" - to Soviet Russia. Moscow, marking it - "wrongly addressed." Sending it back.

The newspapers dated October, finally reaching the right address - seven weeks late. Getting there, after crossing the Atlantic and western Europe - to Moscow. That — Dick - much of an odyssey, to cover the few miles - between Sidney, and Russia, Ohio

FOOTBALL

In Providence, Rhode Island - memories of Eighteen Seventy-Eight. Rather disconsolate memories - for students and alumni of Brown University. Eighty-Three years ago, the Brown Football team - failed to win a game. It tied that - \$/9 w. later - record - two years later.
