Tonight, the international spotlight shifts - from Paris to Vienna. The Kennedy's ready to leave the City of Light - for the Austrian capital. Khrushchev, arriving, before them. The stage is set on the banks of the Danube for tomorrow's confrontation of the two most powerful men in the world.

As for the talks just concluded in Paris - the joint communique hints at a few **rs** unresolved differences between DeGaulle and Kennedy. Today, President Kennedy noted that personal rivalries of the same kind - could result in titanic wars between the Communist powers. The historial analogy creat in the **twometth** Twentieth Century, even though the Red bosses claim to be - such war good friends.

Here's the stinger - in the Presidential analysis. The Romans became open enemies - only after cooperating to destroy the forces opposing them. We can't afford - to let the same thing happen to us. We can't wait for the Communist bloc to be wracked by internal wars - after it's perched on the ruins of the free world.

President Kennedy intends to break - the Roman pattern. Prevent any Red triumvirate from seizing supreme power, as a prelude to future rivalry hum between themselves.

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
In other words, Mr. Kennedy isn't interested in future
