Renewing a bid for cooperation between the United States and Russia -- in the search for a just and durable peace.

This in a commencement address -- at Glassboro

State College. With the President calling specifically

for serious negotiations -- now -- toward a broad

disarmament treaty. Readily possible -- said he -- "if our

two nations can reach binding guarantees -- which preserve

the security of each."

Turning to Paris -- the President noting that preliminary Vietn am peace talks have achieved little as yet. Mainly -- said he -- because Hanoi has responded to



U.S. proposals -- only with propaganda. But there is still hope -- said the President. Adding: "The road" to peace "is far less rocky when the world's two greatest powers -- the United States and the Soviet Union -- are willing to travel part way together."

Be that as it may -- the President's remarks -drawing quick rebuttal from North Vietnamese negotiators
in Paris. Especially the President's suggestion -- that
"an honorable peace requires some gestures on the other
side."

Hanoi's delegation countering that the United States alone -- "holds the key to breaking the deadlock" at Paris. Adding again that Hanoi demands -- "an unconditional cessation of American bombing of North Vietnam;" also, an unconditional cessation -- of all other "hostile acts."

All of which hardly bodes well -- for tomorrow's scheduled resumption of peace talks.

## FRANCE FOLLOW PARIS

By contrast -- a series of major cracks today; in the strike front that has crippled Paris -- indeed, all of France -- over the past seventeen days.

The Bank of France resuming near-normal service -ending a financial log-jam throughout the country. With
several big commercial banks -- also scheduled to reopen
tomorrow. Amid growing signs that railroads, buses and
subways -- will soon be operating again. Not to mention
resumption of mail service -- expected perhaps as early
as Thursday.

Still millions of striking workers -- trying to decide whether to return to their jobs -- or whether to try to continue the nationwide paralysis. No question though -- the threat of civil war and bloodshed that hung over France last week -- now all but vanished.

On the eve of the first anniversary of last year's

June war - broad-scale fighting was reported again today

from the Middle East. With Israeli forces said to have

attacked Jordanian artillery positions - along a twenty-seven

-mile front. Jordan says the Israelis used ground to

ground rockets for the first time - a charge which Israeli

spokesmen deny - but they do say that Israeli planes attacked

Jordanian gun positions which have been shelling Israeli

villages.

Results of the battle - as usual - different to ascertain. However, the Jordanians reporting heavy casualties - thirty dead and sixty wounded in the city of Irbid, some sixteen miles east of the Jordan River. They also say they destroyed - four Israeli jets - four Israeli tanks - three Israeli artillery positions; as well as the Allenby Bridge - one of the two bridges across the Jordan.

War news from Vietnam -- marked today by a pair of fierce battles south of Saigon. U.S. and South Vietnamese troops -- intercepting two large forces of Viet Cong advancing on the capital. In the major clash -- the enemy using a wounded G.I. as bait; methodically cutting down his buddies -- trying to come to his aid.

In the end though -- the Viet Congpaying dearly.

Losing an estimated two hundred and fifty men -- as against

American losses set at thirty-six. South Vietnamese

casualties -- not disclosed.

street-fighting today. U.S. interligence also reporting renewed infiltration --by "five-man cells" of Communists wearing civilian clothes. An indication the Viet Cong intend to continue their terror attacks in the capital -- as long as possible -- as long as it serves their purpose.

Here at home -- a unamimous vote of approval today
from the Senate Armed Services Committee; for General
Westmoreland's appointment -- as the Army's new Chief
of Staff. This following two hours of hearings -- behind
closed doors.

Later though -- the former Vietnam commander meeting with newsmen; saying he views the current Viet Cong attack on Saigon -- as basically a propaganda move aimed at Paris. Westmoreland further quoted as saying the enemy has already lost as many men this year -- as in all of last year; and twice as many -- as in all of Sixty-Six.

On the political front - the end of the beginning today in Campaign Sixty-Eight. With a final series of simultaneous primaries - in half-a-dozen states. Most notably - the Golden State of California; where Senators Kennedy and McCarthy - are staging a showdown battle; one that could well make or break the Presidential aspirations - of either man.

The "why" of it all -- if there can be a reason for such a senseless act -- still a mystery tonight.

Senator Kennedy's would-be assassin -- refusing to talk about the shooting -- refusing even to give his name.

And yet -- a possible motive finally taking shape this afternoon; with identification of the gunman as one -- Sirhan Bishara Sirhan -- age twenty-four; are to the U.S. -- originally born and raised in to the U.S. -- originally born and raised in the Jordanian sector of Jerusalem -- now occupied by Israel.

Observers noting that Kennedy addressed several

Hebrew congregations -- during his \*California campaign.

On each occasion -- calling for Arab recognition of Israel;

also calling for an end to Jordanian terrorist attacks -
against the Jewish state.

The shooting occurred, what's more, on the first annivermary -- of the start of that brief Arab-Israeli war last June.

Be that as it may -- shock waves from the Kennedy shooting -- are, of course, still reverberating across the country. Indeed -- right around the world.

In Washington -- President Johnson -- one of the first to react. Praying for the fallen Senator -- praying also "the divisiveness and violence" -- shall "be driven from the hearts of men -- everywhere." More than that -- the President ordering immediate Secret Service guards -- for all other Presidential candidates.

Acros s town on Capitol Hill -- the shooting further trigger a clamor passage of the President's pending Anti-Crime Bill; including among its provisions -- tough new restrictions on the sale of hand guns.
