GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

Tonight, Britain and France raised the Suez issue in the United Nations - warning that Nasser's attitude is dangerous to peace and security. But the two western nations did not ask for a Security Council debate. They'll wait to see what happens to their "users association".

*Earlier today* Egypt received a virtual ultimatum ~~today~~ - signed  
(if enough other nations go along.

by Britain and France, and approved by America) The plan  
announced by Prime Minister Eden and Premier Mollet.

Sir Anthony, in a ~~fighting~~ speech before the  
Commons - told his hearers that a "users association" will be  
set up to operate the Suez Canal. This "users association" to  
do everything from employing pilots to collecting tolls.  
Egypt, to receive appropriate payments. Other nations, to be  
invited to join this group.

What if Nasser rejects this proposal - as he is  
expected to do? According to Prime Minister Eden, Britain  
and France will then take any measures they feel necessary.  
Premier Mollet told the French people the same thing- in  
a nationwide address. Mollet adding - that the "users  
association" will begin to function immediately.

Paris and London both insist - that they are not  
sabre rattling - but they are rejecting appeasement. Eden  
and Mollet, declaring they know what appeasement led to in

the case of Hitler - and they're not going to try it with Nasser. They won't relax their military ~~re~~ preparations in ~~the~~ ~~Mediterr~~ the Mediterranean - until some solution is found to the Suez crisis.

However, Nasser is still as belligerent as ever. He's called up his entire armed forces - including the National Guard and civilian militia. His fleet is carrying out maneuvers in the Eastern Mediterranean - with the port of Alexandria closed to private shipping. And in Egypt, the papers continue to hammer at one theme - the Suez Canal belongs to Egypt and will not be given up.

The canal itself is threatened more than ever - by a mass resignation of non-Egyptian pilots and other personnel. They ~~saxx~~ say their position in the canal zone has become intolerable. And they want to go home. Their walkout would certainly cripple navigation through the

Suez Canal - and might end it ~~to~~ altogether.

Cairo says the walkout is a plot by the old Suez Company. But the Egyptian government adds - ~~it~~ it won't do anything to stop the foreign pilots from leaving - as long as they don't sabotage ~~anything~~ anything.

The canal is also facing another peril - that grows worse ~~it~~ all the time - the possibility that ships that used to go through the canal - will be re-routed around Africa. That's happened in a number of cases already. And we hear that more nations will boycott the canal - because using it has become unreliable.

## JORDAN

Jordan accuses Israel - of a major atrocity. The charge being, that an Israeli patrol crossed the border last night - and blew up a police station and a school - killing at least twenty persons. According to this report, the Israelis laid down a heavy mortar fire along the historic Hebron-Beersheba road - and then attacked. The Israelis, *are* also accused of ambushing a police car <sup>*that was*</sup> rushing to the aid of the defending Jordanians.

Afterward, the King of Jordan called in the Ambassadors of Britain, France and America. King Hussein, warning them that Arab-Israeli tension is mounting, again.

PLANE

Radio Peking reports that the bodies of two more American flyers - have been handed over to British Officials. William Haskins of Westport, Connecticut, and Jack Curtis, of Kosse, Texas - two more of the crew of that Navy patrol plane, shot down by Red fighters off the Chinese coast last month.

Altogether, bodies of four of the crew have been recovered - the other twelve still missing.

So far, Mao Tse-Tung has rejected all of our protests. Admitting the attack he says only that his pilots thought they were shooting down a Nationalist plane.

The main ~~subject~~ <sup>theme</sup> of his address - getting out the  
vote. He urged Republicans to see that every possible supporter  
of the Eisenhower administration - is registered. He noted  
that it would be, in his words, "an appalling exercise in  
futility - to get the public whipped up to the boiling point -  
only to find that many of them are not eligible to vote.  
~~He~~ <sup>He</sup> suggested ~~antidote for~~ ~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ that - every Republican  
~~is~~ call ten of his friends - urging them to register. The  
G O P to work for a chain reaction among the voters.

But that the G O P should strive for more than that; more than registered Republicans. The President, describing the objects of this campaign as "every Republican - every independent - every discerning Democrat - every thinking citizen." Adding, that the campaign to get out the vote - must be waged in every part of the country - from Maine to Texas - from Puget Sound to the Florida Keys. Laying down this Eisenhower principle for other Republicans to follow: - "Write off no county, no state, as hopeless."

That was the substance of the President's address today - a repetition of what he has often said in the past. This time, making it official. The head of the Republican party, telling his supporters what<sup>to</sup>/do.



## STEVENSON

The Democratic nominee for President - received some optimistic reports today. Adlai Stevenson told that New York and Pennsylvania may go Democratic in November. That would mean - seventy seven electoral votes. Who says so? Oh, New York's Governor Garrison.

## DESEGREGATION

At Clay, Kentucky, Negro children attended the elementary school today - for the first time. But it took the Kentucky national guard to get them in. But the National Guard stood shoulder to shoulder - and permitted Mrs. James Gordon to escort her two ~~young~~ youngsters through into the school. The crowd pressed close to the line of men - and shouted insults. However, there was no violence - and the Gordon children attended their classes.

## SHOOTING

That shooting in Norwalk, California is one of the weirdest murder stories the news has carried in a long time. Three young boys, killing their father - and planning to kill their mother too.

Thomas Parker reprimanded his sons - <sup>one</sup> ~~Tommy~~ ten, <sup>one</sup> ~~Bobby~~ nine, and <sup>one</sup> ~~Richard~~ seven. Then he went to his bedroom, for an afternoon nap.

Norwalk police say - this is what happened. ~~then~~ <sup>The</sup> ~~10 yr. old~~ <sup>Tommy</sup> took down a twenty-two rifle - handed it to <sup>the 7 yr. old</sup> ~~Richard~~ - and said: "Go in and shoot Daddy now." And the seven year old ~~old~~ <sup>old</sup> ~~kid~~ youngster crept into the bedroom - and fired a bullet into the head of his sleeping father.

Their mother was out at the time - so they laid a plot to ambush her, and shoot her too. But she returned unexpectedly - found her husband ~~ya~~ dying - and called the police.

The full story, just now coming out - the three boys confessing ~~the crime and showing no remorse at all~~.

## JESSE OWENS

An eleven year old girl has just received a medal that was awarded to the winner of the one hundred yard dash - in a Nineteen-Thirty-Five college track meet. Trudie Delamartre, of Middletown, New York - accepting the medal from the great Jesse Owens, who won it.

The story begins with Trudie hearing about the scourge, of polio: and the money needed to fight the disease. Ever since then, Trudie has been donating her allowance - one dollar a week - for polio research. Trudie's contribution finally came to the attention of Jesse Owens - now one of the leaders of the Illinois Youth Commission. And the champion runner of twenty years ago - decided that the young lady should get something in return. So he sent her the medal he won back in Nineteen Thirty-five - when he was called the fastest man in the world - setting records that still stand. Jesse Owens remarked of Trudie today: - "Any girl who give up her allowance every week - deserves a medal." So, he gave her one that he won back in 1935.

 The best means of transportation in the Arctic -  
 icebreakers and helicopters. So says Captain Charles Caron -  
 a veteran of exploration in the Canadian north. Captain Caron,  
 just back after taking his own icebreaker on a supply mission -  
 a seven thousand mile trip that brought him within four  
 hundred miles of the North Pole.

Captain Caron says that the helicopter has become  
 indispensable - because it can reach points inaccessible by

ship or dog-sled. <sup>The</sup> ~~He had~~ two helicopters <sup>he had along</sup> ~~on his voyage~~ -  
~~and they~~ unloaded hundreds of tons of cargoes, that could not

have been brought in except <sup>by</sup> ~~through the~~ air. ~~The helicopter~~

<sup>Says</sup> ~~is~~ this veteran skipper, <sup>"Today in the Arctic"</sup> ~~is~~ the most essential  
 means of transportation <sup>is the whirly bird."</sup> ~~in the Arctic regions.~~

But <sup>it first must</sup> ~~the helicopter has to~~ be carried within reach  
 of the shore, <sup>by a ship - by an</sup> ~~and that's the duty of the~~ icebreaker - the

only <sup>craft</sup> ~~ship~~ capable of pushing its way through Arctic waters -  
 also, the best for sounding the depths of the ocean. It's  
 the icebreakers that do the pioneer work in the north --

supplying information for maps to be drawn up during the winter - based on data collected during the summer.

So Captain Caron of the Canadian Arctic patrol - lays down this pattern for future work in the area of the North Pole: - "Sail as near as possible to your destination in an icebreaker, Henry - then get aboard your helicopter and way you go in your whirly bird."
