EGYPT IT- Delco mm. July 1 - 5-7.

In Cairo, a plan disclosed for construction of a pipeline to by-pass the Suez Canal. An Egyptian plan - concocted by President Nasser and the Greek shipping magnate, Aristotle Socrates Onassia.

The idea being - to build a pipeline that will parallel the canal, to handle oil from super-tankers - too large to pass through the waterway.

One angle - to take the edge off western plans.

For pipe-lines - that would make western Europe less dependent on Suez and Egypt.

The United States - to give the Kingdom of Jordan another ten million dollars. Raising the total to thirty millions - granted that anti-Communist Arab state since the Suez Crisis. On Saturday - the government announced - a ten million dollar gift for military aid. Today's grant - for economic aid.

A spokesman for the State Department explaining:
"The pability of Jordan is in our interest."

At the U N - a charge that Israel has fortified a demilitarized area on the Syrian interior. The Israelis - refusing to remove the fortifications. Nor will they admit U N observers into the zone - supposedly demilitarized.

So stated Colonel Byron Leary, of the Truce organization - in a report to the Security Council. The Israeli Ambassador at the U N - immediately replied - that Israel is ready to discuss the issues raised in the report, with a view - to a satisfactory solution.

An important visitor - arrived in New York today.

Crown Prince Faisal comes to this country - for reasons of health. Seeking treatment - for gall stones and ulcers. He'll consult specialists at New York Hospital - and at the Mayo clinic, Rochester, Minnesota.

His arrival, aboard ship - in the lavish manner of the Orient. Falsal accompanied by his wife, four daughters, and three sons. His Royal suite - numbering twenty-five persons. With one-hundred and-four pieces of of them luggage - not counting four automobiles. Three Cadillacs, and

A delegation from the State Department - at the dock to welcome the crown Prince of Saudi Arabia. But - no representative of the Mayor of New York. Mayor Wagner - cold-shouldering Faisal as he did - King Saud, When that monarch was in this country - a little while ago.

On Friday of this week - a wedding. Under circumstances - as odd as any that have ever surrounded a nuptial ceremony. Private William Girard - marrying his Japanese girl friend, Haru (Candy) Sueyama.

Today, Japan, Girard called his family at Ottawa,

Illinois. Asking them - what do they think of the marriage?

Do they object?

All the more interesting, because the family, headed by brother Louis Girard - has been protesting indignantly.

Against the decision - to let William Girard be tried under Japanese law, on a manslaughter charge - for having killed a Japanese woman, while on guard duty. So what do they think - about a Japanese bride for their soldier kinsman?

Today they said - okay. Brother Louis Girard an answering to for them all. Declaring - that the marriage had the blessing of the whole family.

So the ceremony will be held on Friday at &m Camp
Whittington, forty miles from Tokyo. Just three days - before

another scheduled event in this case - the Supreme Court ruling. The high tribunal to give a final say - on whether William Girard shall be tried by the Japanese - or by an American court-martial.

The crew having radioed - that they were in danger, but wouldn't abandon ship and go ashore. Because the marshes were simply boiling with moccasins.

Four mountain climbers - rescued from an ice field high up on Mt. Adams, in the State of Washington. After having survived a laterly cold night - on a ledge at a twelve thousand foot level. Trapped, yesterday - by a raging storm.

A rescue party found Dr. Ralph Uber and Robert

Swenson - walking out. The two others, David Bishop and Mike

McGuire - remaining behind, exhausted, needing help.

Tonight - all four in good condition.

At Key West, Florida, a sailor - who rode an oil drum at sea, drifting for eight days without food or water.

A Cuban, named Perdomo - the sole survivor, apparently, of a freighter that sank in Yucatan channel.

Today, he told how the other ten men of the crew were in the water - trying to get to a lifeboat. While he could only take refuge on an empty oil drum, floating nearby. Which he straddled - drifting away.

"The sea," he relates, "was very rough for several and he added days. "I don't know how I was able to hold onto the drum. When the sea grew calm, sharks came around."

He says he drank a little sea water - but it only made him sick. For sleep - catching an occasional drowsy nap.

"I prayed" he relates, "and thought of my wife and four children at home in Havana. The Lord must have heard me."

He had no hope of rescue, but adds, "something made me hold onto the drum. I couldn't believe it when they picked me up."

At Key West they say the Cuban sailor is in surprisingly good condition - after his ordeal of eight days, & dra at sea - astride a drum!

Until the line was made fast - and the tug was able to get the
