Detective Lieutenant Louis shoulders of the $S t$. Louis police force, got a call from a taxi driver who said - he had a "hot" tip. The cal driver described an individual with a lot of money and a gun - throwing the money around freely; He had instructed the driver to bring a girl to an apartinent, where he would be admitted with a pass word. He acted like a criminal, said the cab man.

They went to the face, gave the pass word, and were admitted. the detective arresting - Carl Austin $H_{a i l}$, who had seven hundred dollars in his wallet, and two suitcases stuffed full of money. Some three hundred thousand in all. Ransom money paid for the release of the six year old boy - Bobby Greenlease kidnapped in kansas City.

Victim to a bungalow in St. Joseph Missouri. Hall says that when he went to the place he found the body, and buried it in the back yard. After that, he and worn an contacted the Grecnlease family in Kansas City, and collected the ransom of six hundred thousand dollars. Then the two quarreled and she left him. He woman - who made off with three hundred thousand dollars of the ransom money. Apparently, the police have recovered most of that.

Tonight, the search is on for Marsh, the other ember of the kidnap trio. All three are liable under Missouri Law, where the penalty for kidnapping 18 -death.
