 THRESHER

Have you heard about the finding of the submarine, Thresher -- out there on the floor of the Atlantic? The Navy now has photographs of the Thresher. There had been a year of futile search. Then the bathyscape "Trieste Two"-- after combing and combing the Atlantic off Cape Cod, a depth of almost two mines, finally found the wreckage of the nuclear sub - at a depth of eight thousand, five hundred feet.

The photos give an identifiAlable picture -- of the hull -- including one section bearing the number -. five nine three - the number of the Thresher.

This doesn't mean -- that the wreckage can be raised to the surface. The depth is far too great -for existing equipment to do this. But at least the Navy now knows -- where it is, and has a possible chance to search for -- the cause of the tragedy. The crushing of the Thresher as she dove too deep -- to withstand the water pressure - carrying one hundred and twenty -nine men - to their tom there at the bottom of the sea -- on the floor of the Atlantic.

that Lyndon Johnson is "soft on Communism,"--
afraid to face up to the challenge of the Soviet Union,
and -- of Red China. Mr. Johnson, weakening our
own nuclear arsenal -- just when Mao Tse-Tung is
about to acquire one. So charged by - Barry Goldwater
