GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

assembling at United Nations headquarters in New York City today
All primed for a high level public discussion - on the Suez
crisis. British Foreign Secretary, Selwyn Lloyd, arrived first.
The Soviet representative, Dimitri Shepilov, is on his way.
This to be his first visit to the United States - since he
succeeded Molotov. The French Foreign Minister, Christian
Pineau, is expected on Friday - along with our own Secretary of
State, Mr. Dulles. The Egyptian delegate, Mahmound Fawzi,
should be in by tomorrow.

This will be the first time since the war - that the Big Four Foreign Ministers have deliberated in public - but it is also expected that they will have private sessions as well.

The U.N. has to decide about two complaints - one by

Egypt, and one by the Anglo-French Alliance. The Egyptians

claim that the Western powers have been threatening world peace

with their words and actions during the canal crisis. Britain

retort that Egypt has created a dangerous situation - by seizing the canal, on her own initiative:

Those two complaints will probably divide the

Big Four Foreign Ministers - in their old familiar pattern.

Russia, backing Egypt. America, Britain and France - supporting the Anglo-French complaint.

When Selwyn Lloyd arrived today - he told newsmen that in Nineteen Forty-Six, Russia favored international control of the canal. Then the British representative went on, "We must wait to see what their attitude is now."

Hopeful waiting - at the United Nations, as the Suez debate draws near.

Closed doors - trying to formulate operating details of the "Users Association" that will try to solve the dispute over the Suez Canal. These committees, to report to the Board of Governors tomorrow. After which, the "Users Association" expects to begin the initial financing. The member nations, hoping they can be ready for operation - before the end of the U.N. Security Council debate on Suez.

One report from London says the Association is having trouble - about an administrative head for the organization. We hear, that two, candidates, one Dutch and one Norwegian, have already declined the job.

And from Cairo, there's the usual repetition that Nasser will not recognize the "Users Association".

KHRUSHCHEV

Tonight, observers in the West are saying - that the latest broadcast by Radio Moscow means that Khrushchev is still in control of the Soviet Communist apparatus. The broadcast announced that wide publicity is to given to the decision of the Party Congress of last February. That was when Khrushchev startled Russia and the world with his attack on the reputation of Stalin - describing the dead tyrant as a homicidal maniac - even keeping his closest associates in perpetual fear of their lives. Radio Moscow adds that speakers will go on the air - to explain the anti-Stalin line - with a hint that Khrushchev himself may broadcast to the Russian people.

This announcement is significant - because the text of that sensational Khrushchev speech has never been published inside Russia. Apparently Khrushchev feels that de-Staliniz ation has gone so far - that his accusations can safely be made public now. Also, he seems to have won out - in a struggle with his rivals in the Kremlin.

Communist bosses in Yalta. We thought then, that Tito was

being brought in by Khrushchev - to explain Stalin's crimes

to the others. Presumably, Tito did just that - and Khrushchev's

colleagues are now convinced. Anyway, the anti-Stalin line is

still official - and will be expanded.

At his press conference today, Secretary of State Dulles repeated, the Black Sea meeting of community bosses show shows that serious problems have arisen - between the Russians and their satellites. Dulles said that the sudden decision of Tito to visit Russia with Khrushchev - indicated some very problem. He believes the problem is dunrest in the satellites, because of Tito's independence. Secretary Dulles has often said that Khrushchev's anti-Stalin policy -- might create tensions that he could not control. Anyway, he seems to top boos at the Kremlin - now that we hear of the wider publication of his anti-Stalin line.

The second big question at the Dulles news conference - aid to Peron. Who helped the former Argentine Dictator - and who brought about his downfall?

Englands sharpest critic of America - has just made a come-back, in a election inside the ranks of the British Labor Party. Aneurin Bevan winning the post of Party Treasurer - the number three job - which puts him in line to become Foreign Secretary if the Socialists win the next national election.

INTEGRATION

Two Negro leaders - differ about the effect on the Negro vote - of that Congressional investigation of integration in the schools of Washington, D.C.

Charence Mitchell, of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People - says the hearings have hurt the Democrats. Mitchell claiming that southern Senators conducted the incident in such a way - as to harm the Negroes in this country. He says he's sure the Democrats will suffer at the polls as a result.

But Congressmen William Dawson, of the Democratic National Committee - doubts that the Negro vote will be effected. Dawson, agreeing that the integration hearings were anti-Negro - but saying, that Negroes will vote Democratic anyway, because of other issues, rise such as the/rime in the cost of living.

Vice-Fresident Nixon campaigned through New England and New York today - speaking at places like Hartford, Connecticut; Manchester, New Hampshire; and Syracuse, New York. All day, Mr. and Mrs. Nixon were on their ceaseless routine of handshaking. Personally greeting hundreds; stopping at schools, factories and village squares. Everywhere, the Vice-President spoke. Today he seemed to be concentrating on Adlai Stevenson and the Stevenson remarks about the Eisenhower administration paying no attention to the cost of living - the Republicans are the Party of big business and so on.

Vice-President Nixon answers, that the American dollar is sounder now than it has been in years. Calling the remark about the Republicans being for the rich and against the poor - "false and vicious." And he used that old expression, saying that it's Stevenson who is offering the voters "pie in the sky" - while the Republicans are offering a sound, practical program.

President Eisenhower will campaign in New York City later this month. So announced by White House Press Secretary, James Hagerty. Mr. Eisenhower, to throw his support behind Jacob Javits, who is running for the Senate, Javits is facing a strong Democratic candidate - Mayor Wagner. Naturally, the Republican candidate would like to have a personal endorcement on the spot by President Eisenhower. Ike naturally is anxious to have the Republicans win this critical N. Y. seat in the U.S. Senate. So Mr. Eisenhower is adding New York City - to his campaign tour.
