Applications for National Defense Student Loa ns for 1961-1962 must be filed in the Dean's office by March 15, '61

The application procedure is as follows:

1)Fill out the preliminary form stating the approximate amount of money you wish to borrow for 1961-1962.

2)Obtain the "Fina ncial Statement" form of the College Scholarship Service. This form, when completed, is to be mailed to the CSS. Allow at least two weeks for processing the form so that it will be returned to the college by March 15, 1961

The college asks the Federal Government for the amount requested by March 15. Any applications received after this date will be considered if any funds are available in September.

Please be realistic in the amount of money you request—neither more nor less than you require to cover normal college expences: tuition, books, transportation, lunches, etc.

Your application in March for a specific amount of money does not bind you in any way to accept it in September. You may accept all, part or none of the amount requested—if circumstances have changed since your original request.

of the University of Illinois, who is responsible for the founding of the Air Force Business School in Dayton, Ohio.

The curriculum would include the following major courses: Price Theory & the Market, and National Income in the Freshman year; Managerial Accounting I-II in the Sophomore year; Public Policies toward Business, Financial Management, and Business Law in the Junior year: Money & Banking, Marketing Management, Personnel Management & Industrial Relations, and Production Management in the Senior year. The degree, being a product of a liberal education affords the student the cultural value of a liberal college, and at the same time gives him the opportunity to secure a major in Business.

This program will be made available not only to the incoming Freshmen, but to the '64' graduates as well. For the present Freshmen it will require that they pick-up the lacking credits in basic economics, which could be done either in the night or day division.

This program already in progress in the night division with a registration of about sixty pioneers, should increase enrollment, as well as establish a well-rounded course of study for Marist. The head of the department for the day division was not disclosed and should be announced later in the year.

S. S. S. Exam

Applications for the April 27, 1961 administration of the College Qualification Test are now available at Selec-Service System local boards

throughout the country.

Eligible students who intend to take this test should apply at once to the nearest Selective Service local board for an application and a bulletin of information.

Following instructions in the bul letin, the student should fill out his application and mail it immediately in the envelope provided to Selective Service Examination Section, Educational Testing Service, Princeton, New Jersey. Applications for the April 27 test must be posted no later than midnight April 6, 1961.

According to Educational Testing Service, which administers the College Qualification Test for the Selective Service System, it will be greatly to the student's advantage to file his application at once. Test results will be reported to the student's Selective Service local board of jurisdiction for use in considering his deferment as a student.
