#### WESTERN FRONT

On the Western Front, Patton's men have completed their occupation of Sarreguemines, one of the biggest factory towns in that region. East of there, is Zweibrucken, where the Nazis have built one of the biggest fortresses of the inner circle of the Siegfried Line. Patton's artillery has begun shelling from a distance of more than thirteen miles. Practically the entire American front is blazing. The Germans are fighting desperately, especiall in the Saar. But Uncle Sam's divisions are pushing them back slowly but surely. The Seventh Army has taken ahgeno Haguenau, the hinge between the Siegfried Line and the old French Maginot Line. General Patch's men broke in at seven o'clock this morning, after fighting in the suburbs of the town for the whole week. Tonight they are eight miles beyond Haguenau. Then, looking north, we find the First Army driving the Mazis back on Cologne, on a ten mile front.

General Hodges's doughboys have taken Merken, twenty-one miles west of Cologne. It is worth remembering that after all these months of fighting, the taking of Merken means that we are just seventeen miles inside of German territory. Get that point.

General Eisenhower broadcast another message to the people of Germany. He warned them that the Allied armies are eventually bound to overwhelm the Nazi Reich. When that happens, Eisenhower said, the German people will be living under a military administration. They will be demobilized and forbidden to join any organizattons of a military character. Every attempt to preserve German militarism will be severely punished by the Allied military government.

#### HERO

A slim young fellow stood in front of his General today and looked as though he were about to faint. He gulped nervously, kept his eyes on the ground as though he wished it would open up and swallow him. You might have supposed the General was about to pronounce a sentence upon him. Actually, the timid young fellow was First Lieutenant Walter Ehlers of Manhattan, Kansas, who, single-handed, had killed e ighteen Germans.

On June Ninth, as a staff sergeant, he led an assault squad against heavy enemy fire, enabling his men to take an advance position. Then the Kansas sergeant went ahead all alone with the Germans concentrating heavy fire on him. He killed eighteen of them and enabled his own squad to knock, out two of the Nazi mortar positions. On the following day a sniper shot Bergeant Ehlers in the back. Nevertheless, he went ahead, rescuing a wounded comrade. Even then he refused to go to the kmpi hospital, and returned to the lines after given first aid.

The next thing that happened to him , they made him a First Lieutenant, on the battlefield; and Lieutenant-General John C. H. Lee, also from Kansas, commanding the communications zone of the European theatre, has now presented him with the Congressional Medal of Honor, and his first rest from fighting since D-Day. They've also rewarded him with a thirty-day furlough -- a trip home to Kansas.

In a small town on the Saar River, a French citizen approached an American military policeman, and implored help of some kind or other. The M.P., Private Luther Savage of Sherman, Texas, mx could understand no French. And what he himself wanted right then was a foxhole, to get out of the rain of enemy shells. But he yielded to the pleas of the French civilian, who led him into a cellar. There, lying on a pile of straw, was the Fremchman's wife, about to have a baby.

Private Savage took one look and decided it was no place for him. Rushing out into the street, he dodged shells until he found an American medical officer. Without any anesthetic, the médical officer helped a beautiful baby girl into the world, while the Texas M.P. held a flashlight -- to the exploding of German shells. DEGAULLE

Not only the French people but the British are making ready to give a warm welcome to General DeGaulle who is on his way back to Paris. On both sides of the Atlantic the treaty of alliance that he negotiated with Soviet Russia has been reported with enthusiasm. The ind London Times declares that the new Franco-Russian treaty will have as warm a welcome in Britain as in France and Russia.

The air war on Germany was resumed today with e thousand, fin no fewer than of Uncle Sam's mar planes in he air over the Reich. Of these, one thousand, six hundred were big bombers. Flying Fortresses and Liberators, the greatest single bomber force ever employed in history. The biggest concentration was over Frankfurt-en-the-Main and nearby railway centers. One airmada was based on Britain, another on Italy. The latter attacked targets in Austria. All in all, they hit Germany with six even thousand tons of bombs, min thousand tons

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#### RUSSIA

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If what we hear is correct, one of the most beautiful cities in Europe, in fact in the world, is being destroyed. Also, once one of the gayest. The Germans are reported to be taking away, as usual, everything portable, including machinery -- and the gold reserve of the Hungarian government. The Hungarian crown jewels are likewise being moved into Naziland.

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## RUSSIA 2

A report from Berlin brings word that the Russians are about to resume their drive in Poland. They have concentrated a huge army on the west bank of the Vistula, some four-hundred-thousand men, with three-thousand, -three-hundred planes and more than five hundred guns. Evidently, they are all set for a winter offensive aimed at Krakow and the German factory towns of Silesia.

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LABOR

A Labor leader in London today described Prime Minister Winston Churchill as a gallant romantic relica of British Eighteenth Century imperialism. Some thousand people laughed and cheered when they heard this. The remark came from Harold J. Laski, presiding over the Forty-Third Annual Conference of with several the British Labor Party. while he said tt, tre members of Churchill's Cabinet were sitting on the platform. But they never batted an eye. This Labor conference is an affair of great political importance, because a general election is due in Britain soon after the defeat of Germany. 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Commonwealth Party.

#### JAPAN

Over in the far East, the Superforts of the Twentieth Air Force continued their bombardment of Japan for five straight days. Apparently, the Twentieth Air Force is using new tactics. Instead of mass bombardment by a large formation, they are sending the great B-29s over in groups of two, even singly. Evidently the idea is to give the Japanese no rest. Also, these missions have had a double purpose, reconnaissance combined with bombing. Starting from the Marianas, they have visited Tokyo, western Japan, Korea and Manchuria. They dropped both explosive and incendiary bombs, with the incendiaries particularly on Tokyo and the other big industrial cities of Japan. Two of the bombers that attacked the Mikado's capital left fires burning that could be seen for eighty-three miles.

The Japanese today admitted that since the beginning of the war, they have lost seventy-three

admirals, six of them quite recently. Since May Twenty-Third, eighteen of their generals have been killed. One of the admirals who died last July was Nagumo, commander-in-chief of the task force that led the attack on Pearl Harbor.

## PHILIPPINES

On Leyte the Yanks of the Seventy-Seventh Division have wiped out the entire garrison at Ormoc. General MacArthur's headquarters reports that this happened after fighting of the most desperate character. The resistance of the **MPE** Japs had become much more ferocious. But the Seventy-Seventh, veterans of the capture of Guam, took Ormoc by storm, and joined up with the battle weary Seventh.

MacArthur does not tell us how many Japs his men killed except that **they** strong. And, the destruction of that Jap garrison wipes out the entire southern segment of Yamasita's defense line. BRITISH FLEET

British Admiral Sir Bruce Fraser arrived at Melbourne today bringing news of the great fleet he will command in the war on Japan, battleships, aircraft carriers, cruisers, destroyers and many other vessels. In fact, there will be altogether two British fleets, and among them will be some of the newest and proudest of Britannia's men-'o-war. Sir Bruce Fraser himself will fly his flag on the great battleship HOWE, a forty-thousand tonner, completed in Nineteen Forty-two, one of the most powerful battlewagons afloat. Admiral Fraser will serve under either Nimitz or General McArthur as the necessity arises.

## DRAFT

There was quick action today upon the order of Mobilization Director Jon Byrnes, the work-or-fight order. General Hershey told all the draft boards to cancel the deferrments of all men between eighteen and thirty-seven, who have left jobs in war plants. Hershey repeated the known fact that there is a **nost** critical shortage in war activities. And there is also a continuing urgent need for combat replacements in all theatres of war.

Officials of the War Production Board are going to ask non-essential employers to lend help to war industries for ninety days. That means, owners of stores, banks and other similar civilian concerns. CRIME

After every big war there is a crime wave, and the F.B.I. tells us that this is beginning. already. J. Edgar Hoover reports that kidnapping are on the increase; though at one time that situation was under and kidnappings had ceased entirely. J. Edgar Hoover said further that bank robberies are being reported. A number of these are being committed by discharged veterans; But, he added, they are veterans who had criminal tendencies before they entered the armed services.

To meet this growing situation, he is bringing groups of his agents in the field back to headquarters in Washington for fresh training.

Some western congressmen say it is time the government quit establishing new national parks in Wyoming. Already Uncle Sam owns thirty-two million acres of the "Equality" state. He also owns the minera rights on eighteen million acres more. On top of that, the President proposes to take two hundred and twentyone thousand additional acres and call them the Jackson Hole National Monument.

The two hundred and twenty-one thousand acres for the Jackson Hole Monument consist mostly of sage brush flats, Barrett said. There is only one building on those acres, and that is a log cabin where Jesse James once hid from the sheriff's posse. Says Barrett: "We would have parks all over the west if

#### GREECE

In Greece, the situation is no better. There is a virtual state of war between the British and the Elas. The British government has been obliged to send reinforcements to Athens, which are now under way. The ancient capital has been comparatively quiet all day, but there are fifteen thousand Elas, well equipped and well organized fighters, opposed to the Popendreou government in the city and the outskirts. The northern part of the country is controlled by the Elas.
