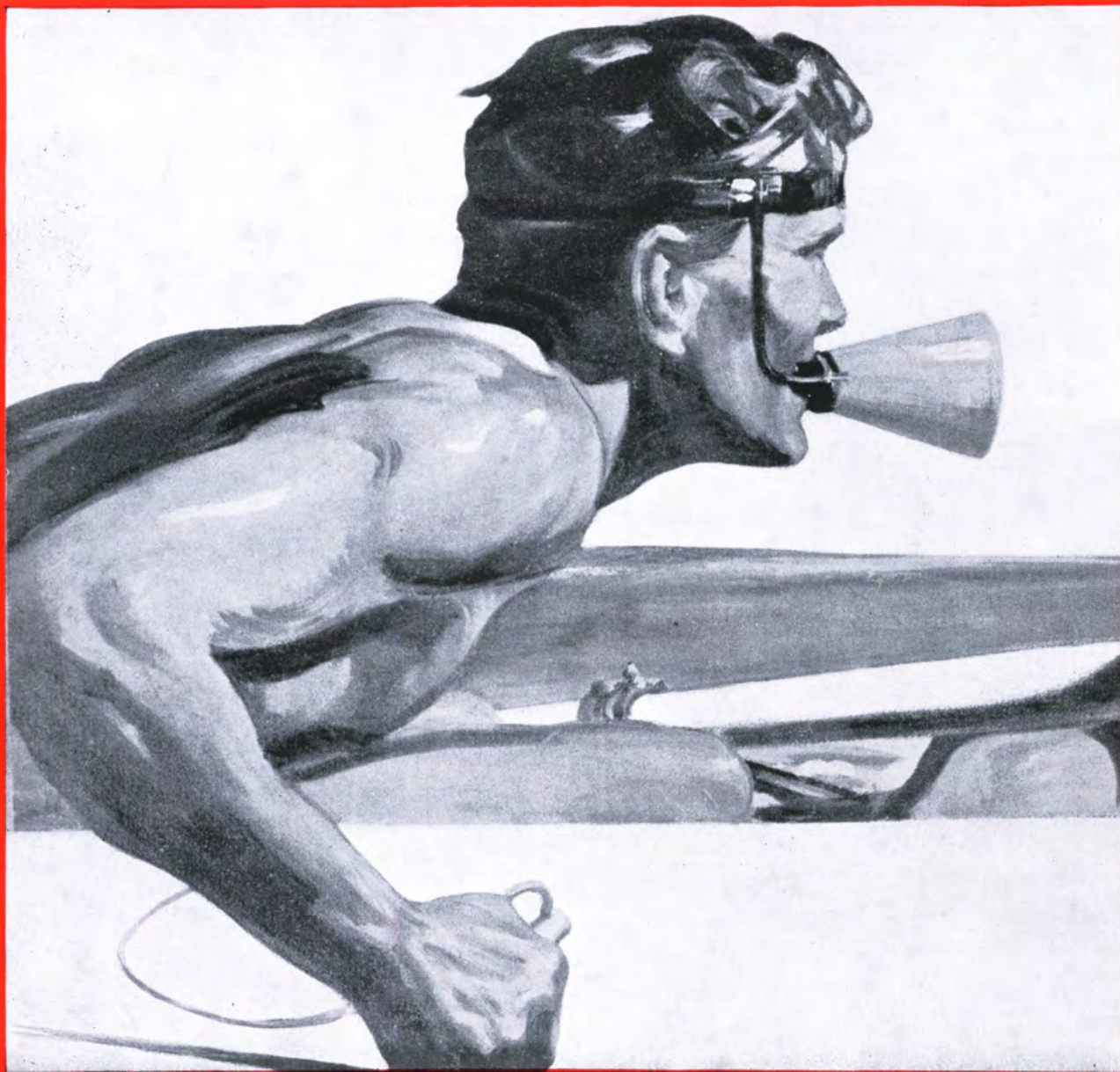

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

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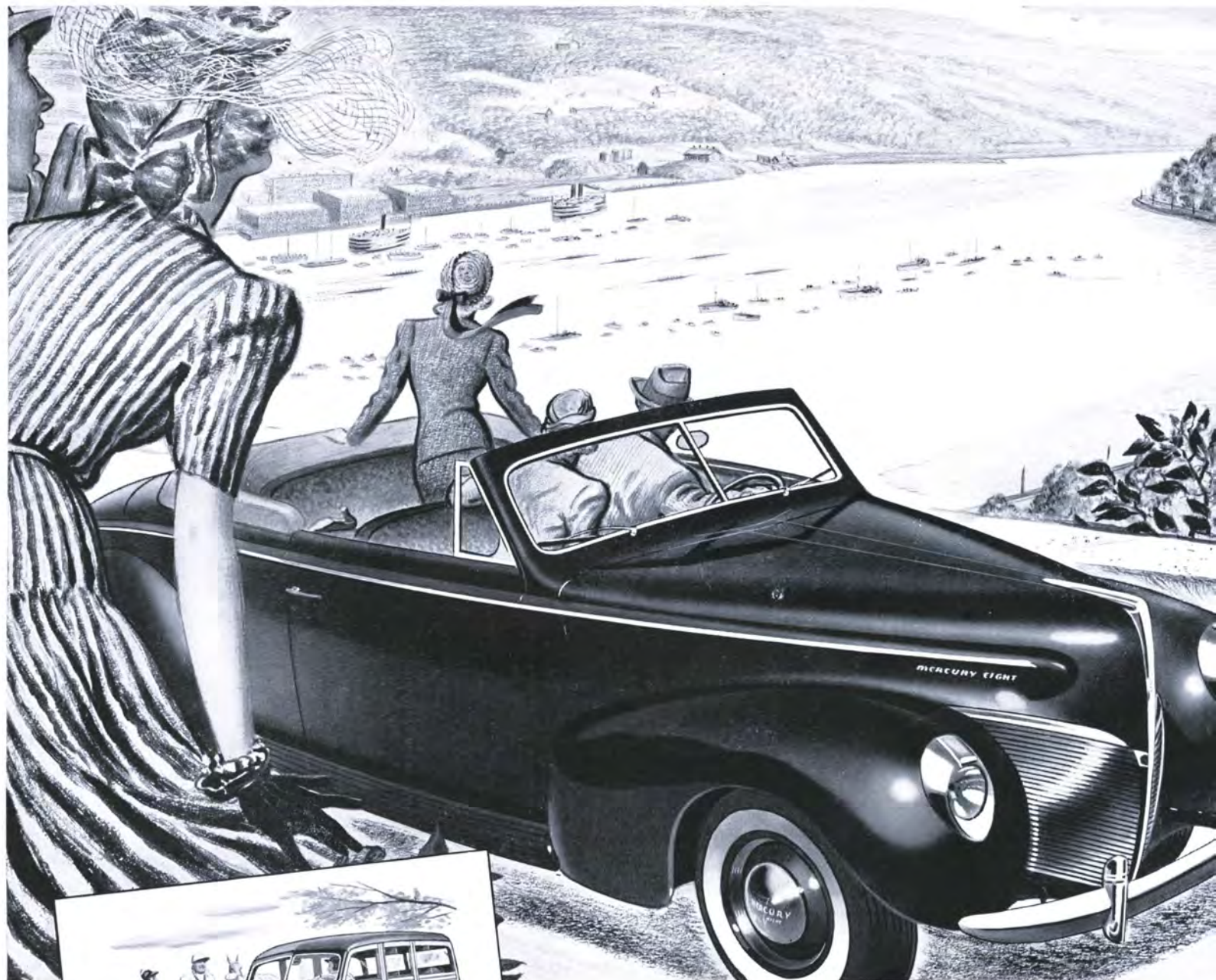
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REFEREE OF THE REGATTA



JULIAN WHEELER CURTISS, Yale '79, began his association with intercollegiate rowing as a member of the crew of his alma mater in 1878, the first year of Harvard-Yale rowing on the Thames. Referee of the Poughkeepsie Regatta since 1918, dean of rowing officials in the United States, his skill in handling the large number of Poughkeepsie entries is each year a cause for admiration from rowing enthusiasts.

The Referee's yacht this year is E. Townsend Irvin's "Tara."

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THE COACHES



GLENDON, OF COLUMBIA

Hubert Glendon started his coaching career in 1928 as coach of Columbia's 150-pound crew, which won the Joe Wright Cup and in 1929 won the Marlowe at Henley, England. In 1932, he turned out another eight to win the Joe Wright Cup. He became head coach in 1934 with his famous father, Richard A. Glendon, as associate. Alastair MacBain, Columbia '29, former varsity stroke and twice a member of Poughkeepsie championship varsity crews, is Glendon's assistant.

SANFORD, OF CORNELL

Harrison Sanford, who is in his fourth year as Cornell varsity coach, graduated from the University of Washington in 1926. As an undergraduate, he rowed under Rusty Callow, now coach at Pennsylvania, and was on winning crews with Al Ulbrickson and Tom Bolles. After graduation, he engaged in business in Seattle and coached the Washington Athletic Club. Under his guidance, the Big Red crews have been steadily improving.

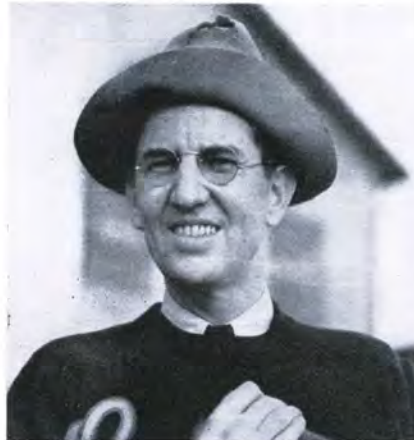


TEN EYCK, OF SYRACUSE

Former coach of several boat clubs and then head coach at Rutgers, Ned Ten Eyck came to Syracuse in 1937 to assist his father, the late James A. Ten Eyck, Orange mentor for 34 years, and succeeded him in 1938. A champion sculler, national singles champion from '98 through '01, Ned competed from 1895 to 1901 without losing a race. At 17, he was the first American to win the Diamond Sculls at the Royal Henley.

WALSH,
OF NAVY

Charles S. Walsh is serving his ninth year as head coach of rowing at the Naval Academy. A former Navy oarsman and a graduate of the Academy in 1923, he returned to Annapolis as assistant crew coach in 1924. In 1926 he was named coach of the freshman crew, and was appointed head crew coach in 1932.



EBBRIGHT,
OF CALIFORNIA

Carroll M. "Ky" Ebbright, scholarly crew coach at California for the past 16 years, has the best record of any active coach in the country. His eights have won world's titles twice: at the Olympic Games in Amsterdam in 1928 and at Los Angeles in 1932. In addition, his varsity crews have swept to victory five times on the Hudson. His 1939 crew holds the record for the Poughkeepsie course.

SPUHN, OF PRINCETON

Fred Spuhn rowed for 4 years as an undergraduate at the University of Washington, pulling No. 6 oar in the varsity crews that won at Poughkeepsie in 1923 and 1924. After graduation, he went to Harvard as 150-pound coach for 1924-25, to Pennsylvania as head coach for 1926-28, to Yale as Freshman coach for 1928-34 and as 150-pound coach for 1934-37, and to Princeton as head coach in 1937. During recent summers, he has coached at Havana, Cuba.



ULBRICKSON, OF WASHINGTON

The coach that stayed home is Al Ulbrickson—one of the 20 former Washington oarsmen who are major crew coaches throughout the nation. He has managed to carry on a great Husky tradition—fine crews. His has been the only triumvirate of shells to sweep the Hudson—and they did it twice, in 1936 and 1937. At Poughkeepsie his Junior varsity in 8 races has taken 4 firsts, 2 seconds, and 2 fourths; his varsity in 11 races has taken 2 firsts, 3 seconds, 5 thirds, and one sixth.



HUNN, OF WISCONSIN

Ralph E. Hunn is, at 29 years, one of the youngest rowing coaches in any major American university. A Badger coxswain in '31 and '32, Hunn then served as freshman crew coach at Wisconsin under George W. Murphy. When Murphy resigned in 1933, Hunn succeeded him as varsity coach. Under Hunn, rowing interest has been greatly increased in the student body. This year, 32 intramural crews participated in the annual regatta, racing in specially built, 4-oared coxswain shells.

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HOW TO IDENTIFY THE CREWS

The competing crews may be identified by the color of the coxswain's jersey and of the flag on the bow of the shell, as follows:

Columbia—light blue	California—gold
Cornell—light red and white	Princeton—orange and black
Syracuse—orange	Washington—white
Navy—dark blue	Wisconsin—red

ORDER OF FINISH

Indicated by Flags

The order in which the crews *finish* will be indicated by flags suspended from both the Railroad and the Vehicular Bridge, the regular college colors of the winning crew being the top flag. Flags will also be hoisted on the mast of the referee's boat, the colors of the winning crew being the uppermost flag—the rest hoisted in the order of finish. The flags will be of the following colors:

Columbia—light blue and white	California—dark blue and gold with white "C"
Cornell—red and white	Princeton—orange with black "P"
Syracuse—orange with dark "S"	Washington—purple and gold with white "W"
Navy—blue and gold with white "N"	Wisconsin—red with white "W"

By Bulletin Board

A Bulletin Board has been erected on the Judges' Boat, located at the Finish Line. The order in which the *first three* crews finish in all races will be indicated on this Board, the lane number of the crew being used in place of its college name. This use of the lane number was found necessary owing to the distance of the Judges' Boat from the shore.

The lane number of the winning crew will be at the top, and below it will be the lane numbers of the other two crews, in the order of finish.

The time made by each crew will appear opposite the number of its lane. For example, if the crew in lane No. 10 won, and its time was 20 minutes and 30 1-5 seconds, the top line on the board would read: "10-20-30-1."
