Good Evening:

After days of debate, the U.S. Senate voted, SixtyEight to Twenty-Five, to stop the sale of the kind of
handguns that can be easily hidden. The bill the Senate
passed, and sent to the House, was sponsored by Indiana's
Democratic Senator Birch Bayh, who says: "This will take
out of the market place the weapons that are most
frequently used by criminals."

What the bill does is prohibit the sale of shortbarrelled pistols, some of which are of high quality, but
most are the cheap, lightweight type known as Saturday
night specials. About a million of the short-barrelled
handguns are sold every year; the bill does nothing about
those that have already been sold and are now in private
hands.

Campaign 'Seventy-Two - "the first day." So

proclaimed - by George McGovern; as he and his new running

mate, Sargent Shriver - were off and running today.

First stop - a breakfast meeting with Democratic mayors; where McGovern made, what he called "a flat commitment" - to work for the speedy passage of one of President Nixon's key proposals; revenue-sharing. Said Senator McGovern: "We've got to make a choice as to where our enemy is. Is it in Hanoi - or is it in the cities in the form of drugs and crime."

Next - a meeting with the National Women's Caucus;

Senator McGovern pledging that women will have a "co-equal status" - "from the top of the campaign to the lowliest position;" then - a similar pledge to the party's Spanish-speaking caucus. There McGovern said: "The Latin+American community in this country - is going to be represented in proportion to its numbers in this campaign."

The Democratic candidate - also met with

Democratic Senators and Governors, reportedly giving them assurances that he will not enter their various states - without prior consultation.

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COMMITTEE FOLLOW MCGOVERN

The Democratic National Committee met again today
- supposedly in the spirit of party unity, and plunged into
a brief, heated debate - over party control; finally ending
in a compromise.

The McGovern forces to remain in power - at least through November. And after that - it depends on the outcome of the election. Today's action paves the way for a drastic overhaul of the committee - if it is considered necessary after the election.

CONNALLY FOLLOW COMMITTEE

The "Democrats for Nixon" drive; was launched today - by former Secretary of the Treasury John Connally; who charged that Senator McGovern has turned the Democratic Party - into "an ideological machine:" one that is now closed to millions of loyal Democrats.

More of the same from New York; where the former head of the Congress of Racial Equality endorsed President

Nixon "unequivocally." Floyd McKissick adding that Black participation in the Republican Party - will open still "another avenue to advance the cause of the black people."

In the war - an attempt was made today to beef up the defenses - at South Vietnam's ancient imperial capital of Hue. The authorities in Saigon - sent in an additional six hundred troops, assigned to key infiltration routes; serving as an added precaution - against the possibility of another Tet-type attack.

Some thirty miles to the North - the battle for Quang Tri City continues to drag on, and is at the moment mainly an artillery duel with both sides apparently biding their time.

In Northern Ireland - this first anniversary of the British policy of internment brought with it - a series of Catholic protest demonstrations; including, in Belfast - an anti-British rampage by hundreds of children; some - said to be as young as ten years old.

The youngsters reviled British troops - stoned

British Army posts - hijacked and burnt buses and cars stopped a train and tried to set it afire - even tried to ram

one police post with a crane; no one seriously hurt; the day's
lone fatality, at last report was terrorist attempting to

plant a bomb on the outskirts of Newry - when the bomb west

off in his face. Victim Number Five Hundred and Two in

three years of violence - proving to be his own executioner.

For the first time since World War Two - the sound of military explosives echoed and reechoed across Moscow today, as The Soviet Army blasted trenches hundreds of yards wide - in an effort to contain the vast peat and brush fires in the nearby boglands. While Soviet Officials said that criminal proceedings have already been started - against an unspecified number of persons; said to have started it all - through "criminal negligence, carelessness and mishandling of fire."

The city of Moscow is still enshrouded in thick
black smoke, and a local newspaper notes that "everything
from the walls of houses to subway trains to the trees in
Gorky Street - seems to smell of smoke."

In Pakistan's Sind Province - which includes

Karachi - eight Pakistani political leaders were picked up

and tossed into jail today, in an attempt to head off the

possibility of additional language riots - like those that

have now claimed at least eighteen lives. The Chief

Minister of the province - also closed schools and colleges

until further notice, pledging "all necessary action to

restore peace and tranquility" to defeat the "forces of

anarch and chaos."

A story of instant justice - from Dallas, Texas;

where a young mother was summoned to police headquarters

- to pick up her nine-year-old son who was caught stealing

plums. The mother arrived at headquarters with a

switch - which she applied on the spot. Leaving police

plum full of respect - and her son plum sorry.

In thirty-three provinces in Northern Italy - a massive police crackdown: more than five thousand "carabinieri" - setting up hundreds of roadblocks; checking some sixty-four thousand persons - and more than forty-five thousand vehicles; putting on a series of coordinated raids - and inspecting more than five thousand business establishments.

The net result is: More than twelve thousand traffic fines - and hundreds of arrests for any number of suspected crimes and the police also seized large quanities of illicit material - including firearms, explosives, pornographich photos, pilfered paintings - every kind of contraband except, smuggled spaghetti.

Off the coast of California, the case of the disappearing kelp - finally solved. Full story - as follows:

The kelp, as you perhaps know - a giant seaweed; growing faster than any other plant in the world - two feet and more in a single day; with a single plant - sometimes reaching as much as two hundred feet in length.

But more than that - kelp is the source of a valuable chemical called algin; a chemical used to smooth and thicken - more than three hundred different products; everything from ice cream and spaghette sauce - to paints and toothpaste.

And once again - says Professor North - "the ecological balance has been tipped in man's favor." For now, anyway.
