May Day passed in Berlin - with only minor disturbances. The Reds held a huge mass meeting in the Soviet Sector, while the anti-Communists rallied with equal vigor in Western Berlin. The police were mobilized, and troops of the Western Powers were in readiness fearing outbreaks. There was only one that amounted to anything, when stragglers from the anti-Communist meeting started hurling stones at Red policemen guarding a Soviet monument near the Brandenburg Gate. But police of both sides, Communist and Western, joined in quick suppression of the rioters hurling the stones.

In Moscow, Kay Day was an immense affair, as
usual. Stalin, who has been seen in public mighty
little of late, made an appearance at the ceremony in Red $S$ quatre - while a crowd of two million watched a giant military parade, in which General Vassily Stalin, son of the Red chieftain, led a roaring pageant of the squadrons of the sky.

REDS

There's nothing like - verisimilitude, when you stage a show. So that's what they had at Mosinee, Wisconsin, today, in one angle at least. The Wisconsin town celebrated May Day, as announced - with a pageant of what would happen if, in a Red seizure of power, an American town were taken over by the Communists. Of course, they didn't actually massacre anybody, but the verisimilitude was there.

The American Legion staged the revolution with a seizure of town buildings, the red flag raised on city hall, people thrown into jail. And, in the presence of a crowd on a football field, renamed "Red Square", the mayor under arrest, surrendered the town to the Communists at pistol point - was then thrown into a concentration camp. But the chief of police was defiant, and he was executed - with a pistol shot.

The point of verisimilitude was this - two of the Red commissars were former leaders in the Communist Party - one Benjamin Gitlow, who repeatedly ran for Vice-President on the Communist ticket. But Gitlow broke
with Communism, and wrote a starting expose, a book called "The Whole of Their Lives." So he today, the one-time Communist candidate for vice-president, executed the chief of police. Verisimilitude.

Another witness testified today that Owen
Lattimore was a Communist. Mrs. Freda Utley, herself once a member of the Communist party. She stated that she had no proof that the Far Eastern expert was ever a card-carrying paris member - lit told a story picturing him as Freda they, so she related, was a Communist who went to Soviet Russia in $\mathbb{N}_{\text {ineteen }}$ Thirty, and what she saw in the land of Stalin changed her mind completely. "In a few months", she said today, "I ceased to be a Communist." However, she remained in Moscow for seven years - because she married a nonCommunist Russian, and he could not leave. "Eventually," she says, "my husband was arrested and sent to a slave labor camp. I have presumed him dead." She said she first met Owen Latimore and his wife in Nineteen Thirty-Six, when they were in Moscow Lattimore there as an American delegate from the Institute of Pacific Relations. Which institute, by the way, has been denounced repeatedly as Communist
controlled. She testified that, in Moscow, Lattimore worked with the number-one Soviet economist, Eugene Varga-coilaborating with him in the Russian branch of the Institute of Pacific Relations. Lattimore and his wife, she said, expressed sympathy for her plight and criticized the tyranny of the soviet Reds. But then, afterward, she became aware that they were turning to Communism.

After the Moscow days, she associated with
them again in London and in the United States. Lattimore himself has testified that they had Mrs. Utley in their Baltimore home, because they were sorry for her. Today Mrs. Utiey stated that Lattimore began list by showing sympathy for the Soviet regime, and ended with an out-and-out party-1ine defense. "He wants, it seems to me, to be on the winning side - and he thinks the Communists are going to win," said she.

She declared that Lattimore was associate
editor of the Magazine Amerasian in Nineteen Phirty-Nine and 'Forty, Which magazine later on, was involved in
headline charges of Red espionage. She noted that Amerasia, following the party-line, defended that famous Hitler -Stalin Pact - for which Lattimore, as an editor, shared responsibility, according to her argument. Further signs, she said, would be found in his writings. "Consistently, subtly and cleverly, he has followed close to the party line," declared the witness.

"workers arise, prepare yourselves for the revolution". Whereupon she assailed the bailiff, and was carried out of court, kicking and yelling revolutionary slogans. The Judge sent her to a hospital for a mental examination.

## GAMBLING

In Washington, it was told today how big-time gamblers play tricks with telephones. Before a Senate Committee investigating crime, a witness testifying for the American Telephone and Telegraph Company stated that no long distance line was ever leased to an outfit known to be in an illegal business - but the bookmakers, getting horse race information, have cunning dodges and devices. He said they employ experts who string wires and move telephone instruments into their headquarters so cleverly that the Telephone Company knows nothing about it.

He was asked - how it happened that a bookmaking center may have fifteen or twenty telephones, while an ordinary subscriber may have trouble getting one i The answer was - that the gambling gang will buy up instruments from legal subscribers, move them, wires and all, to a central exchange, from which race track information is sent out.

The witness for the Telephone Company was asked about testimony, which shows that the gambling

crowd will go so far as to install telephones in trees, where a spotter watches the results of horse races, and phones the results instantly to headquarters. The response was that the Telephone Company never installs a telephone up a tree.

The Senators on the committee, however, were not so sure that the company was entirely free of responsibility for the extensive use the gambling information business makes of the telephone lines. Remarks were passed - that its lucrative income for the company.

The proceedings before the committee
concerned a proposed bill to outlaw the interstate
transmission of gambling information - and impose a
good deal of the burden on the Telephone Company. To which the company spokesman responded today - that the Telephone people should not be made to assume police powers. They argue that it would be - "dangerous" for them to censor telephone calls. Which would require listening -in on millions of telephone conversations.

In Kansas City, meanwhile, a report was
issued - and a wave of the $x$ jitters goes through the underworld of gambling. Seven months ago, a Federal Grand Jury, impanelled at the request of President Truman, began an investigation of illegal bookmaking, dice games, the numbers racket - and today titi its findings were made public. The trail leads immediately to Charles Binaggio, the political bigshot and his hoodlum Henchman Gargotta - killed recently in those sensational Kansas City murders.

The report shows that last year Binaggio's outfit grabbed the numbers racket in Kansas City - a three million dollar a year business. The Binaggio crowd took over the criminal numbers lottery without paying a penny - merely through the prestige of their underworld power. While Binaggio's lieutenant, Gargotta, with two other gangsters, used their position in the mob to seize control of the distribution of racing information in Kansas City.

All of which would certainly seem to tie in
