plane. Just before it took off, a group of Congolese

gathered at the cockpit - jeering the Soviet crew, who

stared back unsimilingly - and seemed Eixgleick glad

when the takeoff signal was given.

What about last night's battle? The Congolese claim that the U.N. guards from Tunisia -- fired first. Touching off the fight at the Ghana Embassy.

Today's meeting between Lyndon Johnson and Charles

DeGaulle -- is described as 'very cordial'. The Vice

President elect of the United States - conferring for an

hour with the President of France. Afterward, Johnson

said he was grateful - for the chance to meet a great leader

of the free world. DeGaulle termed the meeting with Johnson

- "memorable."

The day was "memorable" for DeGaulle - for two other reasons. This was his seventieth birthday. And he won a vote of confidence - in the Paris National Assembly. The issue - a separate nuclear striking force under French control. The deputies voting for DeGaulle, on that.

Our government has decided not to curb tourist spending - in an effort to strengthen the dollar. A ceiling on spending abroad - could stop a big leak in the flow of gold out of this country. Last year the figure was -- almost one and a half billion. Some Washington officials thought we should lower that figure - by setting a limit on individual spending.

But to interfere in this way - would be contrary to our free trade policies. We would be doing - what we have asked our allies not to do. And we would weaken the economics -- of friendly nations.

Washington announces that our patrol of the Caribbean off Central America - will be continued indefinitely. The State Department, making this reply to rumors - that we might pull out flotilla back - in a few days. Instead of doing that - we re adding another ship. The aircraft carrier "Wasp" sailed from Boston to take part in the operation. She'll relieve the carrier "Shangri-La" which is already in the Caribbean. The "Wasp" carries bombers, search planes, helicopters - and a complete radar warning system. She's ready for action in case Castro should attempt to send an invasion ps force from Cuba to Central America.

The new center for atmospheric research will be located - on Table Mountain, Colorado. So announced the by our National Science Foundation.

The head of this meteorological laboratory -Doctor Walter Robberts, of the observatory at Boulder.
