Today's longshoremen's strike - unexpected. The contract between the Companies and Union - expired at midnight. But it looked as if a truce would be arranged - delaying a walkout of the dock workers while negotiations were continuing.

However, the southern shipping companies would not agree # that a new contract would be retroactive, Applying to the period of the truce. Which refusal - was followed by a walkout of longshoremen at Gulf ports. Beginning - with New Orleans. Followed - immediately by an extension of the strike to the Atlantic coast.

Tonight, one hundred thousand dock workers are out. Bringing about a tie-up of seaports - from Maine to Texas.

Now we have two huge strikes. Waterfront - added to the steel strike.

In this latter dispute, negotiations began again today - between the Companies and the Steel Workers! Union. This Pollowing yesterday's intervention - by President Eisenhower.

Who demanded that they get tog ther for an end of what is already - the longest steel strike in the history of this country.

The explosion atcharleston, South Carolina, today, could have been a holocaust. If it had happened - a couple of hours later. A huge gasoline storage tank blowing up - along a principal highway. Mrs. Vester, I think is the most remarkable living American woman. A modern Florence Nightingale. From Californiai - came the well known actress of stage and screen, Beulah Bondi, a pal of mine in college. And,

as a top surprise of all - Count Felix von Luckner, the Sea Devil - and his Sweedish countess. All the way - from wherever they were in Europe - one from Hamburg, the other from Stockholm.

Who wouldn't be startled - being greeted by such an array of old friends! Maybe I should have been in tears, but I was too flabbergasted. And amazed - at the resourcefulness and enterprise of Ralph Edwards and his associates in bringing my old friends from out West, and from Europe and Asia.

A weird end - in the story of Bingo, the dog without a country. About whom we heard - a couple of weeks ago. The Australian pooch - wandering aboard a Dutch freighter at Sydney.
