## SUB CONFERENCE L.T.- Fri. Oct. 1-54.

Late word, this evening, is that today's meeting of the London conference was heated - angry. British Foreign Secretary, Anthony Eden, deploring a new deadlock. French Foreign Minister, Mendes France, having tossed the proverbial monkey wrench in the conference machinery. Taking a stubborn position on an "armament pool."

Eden reminded Mendes France that Britain had made a huge concession - in agreeing to maintain large military forces on the continent. A deparature -from British traditional principle of aloofness.

American Secretary of State, John Foster Dulles,
intervened - easing matters by supporting a Canadian proposal
that the talks be discontinued until tempers cooled. Let
things ride - until tomorrow.

The question concerns the amount of control to be exercised under the Brussels as treaty - control over the amount of armament possessed by the various mask western countries, which would include - American military aid.

Previously, Secretary Dulles had stated plainly - that we would not relinquish our control over the military aid that we provided.

Dulles, seeking to pacify things, has offered a compromise. And it seems that the French might accept it.

All of which, however, goes over until tomorrow.

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Red Czechoslovakia has agreed to release two American soldiers made prisoner last month. Lieutenent Richard H.

Dries, of New York City, and Private George Fisk of Austin,

Texas. Who - were seized near the German Czech border.

The Reds - accusing them of espionage. Saying - they crossed the border of the Iron Curtain, and snapped camera pictures.

Also - looked around with is binoculars.

American military authorities called this - ridiculous.

Declaring - that the Lieutenant and the soldier were on our side of the Iron Curtain.

Well, the argument seems to have ended. The State

Department, today, amnouncing that the Red regime has promised

the release of the two Army men tomorrow.

The spy sensation in France came to a climax today, with the arrest of two high government officials. Rene

Turpin, an administrator of the National Defense ministry - and Roger LaBrusse, head of the "National Protection service in that ministry of defense.

They've confessed that they handed over top secrets
to a card-carrying Communist, who supplied information to
the French Communist Party. Giving him - detailed information
about three hush-hush meetings of the French National Defense
Council.

A government spokesman says the two high officials were motivated by what he called, "ideological reasons" which would seem to mean that the two functionaries in the National Ministry of Defense - were Communists.

## FOLLOW FRANCE-ESPIIONAGE

A later dispatch states - that the Secretary General of the French National Defense Council has been suspended from his duties.

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Red China made a big noise today, with an order to the Communist Army. Red military forces alerted - for an invasion of Formosa. We don't know how much reality there may bein this - or how much propaganda. The threatening order was part of a giant celebration in Peking - the Fifth Anniversary of the Chinese Communist regime.

There was a huge military parade - and, on the reviewing stand, was Krushchev of the Kremlin. Regarded - as number two to Malenkov.

The big shot from the Kremlin may have taken special of note -/where an enormous portrait/ where dominated the scene.

A picture of Mao Tse-Tung - several hundred times life size.

In Russia, they used to feature Stalin that way. Though, now, the one-man worship has gone out of star style. But, still the vogue in Red China.

The Emperor Bao Dai, today, intervened personally in the political crisis that has Viet Nam, or what's left of it, in a turmoil. His Imperial Majesty ordering Premier Diem to take into his cabinet three Generals. One- Diem's own arch enemy, the Army Commander. As of now, it isn't clear whether the Premier will obey the imperial order.

Bao Dai's intervention doesn't mean he has gone back to Indo China. The Emperor sent his order by cable - from his vacation residence on the French Riviera. The dispatch the /playboy monarch/sticking to his favorite playground.

The signing of an agreement will sure be welcome news in London and Washington. The dispute over Trieste - a long drawn out beadache for Britain and the United States.

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The American Communist Party has adopted - a new "line".

So says F B I Chief J. Edgar Hoover - in a monthly "law enforcement bulletin."

The Red leadership, which is operating underground, has issued secret word - that the new line sm is to be "peaceful socialism." Convince gullible Americans - that the Communist party is not a subversive conspiracy. But - a mere political movement to bring about economic reform.

"A peaceful path to socialism" - that's the label, the new party line.

J. Edgar Hoover warns - it's mere "temporary strategy" and adds, "the overthrown and destruction of our constitution and democracy by any and all means at their disposal - remains the aim of the Communists."

It looks as if Nevada may have an election - to decide on a successor to fix fill out the term of the late Senator McCarran. Fill it out, that is, from the first of the year on through Nineteen Fifty-Six. Today, Governor Charles Russell named Earnest Brown, a Reno lawyer, to be Senator from not until the first fa of the year.

The Republicans hope to make the appointment permanent.

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## ARCHEOLOGIST

The Canadian Archeologist, Richard MacNeish, is heading for Alaska, once more. Seeking - the migration route of the ancestors of the American Indians. What were the trails they took? In the spring, MacNeish supervised an important archeological find in Central Mexico - with revelations of the pre-history of the Indians. Then, in the summer, he went up to Alaska - to a section where other discoveries could be expected.

One day, hiking along, in he just happened to kick at a small mound of earth. And up came - objects made of bone and flint. Primitive tools - more than five thousand years old.

Stone age implements - marking that migration route.

MacNeish, a scientist attached to the Canadian National Museum, had business which took him back to Ottawa.
