Reverse side - Communist gunners today subjecting the great city of Saigon - to its first rocket attack in weeks. Enemy shells killing at least seven, two of whom were just children.

At the United Nations - in New York - Britain's Sir Colin Crowe today urged the Arabs and Israelis to negotiate a new package deal. One that would call for an Arab commitment to the cause of peace - coupled with an Israeli withdrawal from conquerered Arab lands. Sir Colin adding that such a deal could be endorsed by the UN Security Council - and then supervised by UN personnel; always bearing in mind - said he that "these elements are of equal importance; connot be taken without the other."

RIGHTS FOLLOW UNITED NATIONS

At the same time - a special three nation committee was filing a report today with the Un V N General Assembly - a reporting accusing the Israelis - of violating the human rights of Arabs living in occupied territory. However, Israel promptly rejecting the accusation - calling it "an organized propaganda exercise wanting in minimal judicial gurantees."

Overseas again - Britain's "dirty jobs" strike entered its sixth week today; with Londoners walking the streets amid in piles of uncollected garbage in some cases higher than their heads.

One oasis though in the sea of clutter - number Ten Downing Street where the Lady Caroline French Blake - nineteen year old daughter of the Duke of Saint Albans - gathered together a volunteer cleanup crew. Lady Caroline saying "we don't think that people coming to see the Prime Minister - should have to wade through all this rubbish." Economist Patrick Evershed - who helped out - adding: "Our action was a demonstration of patriotism - and a demonstration against industrial anarchy."
