kT.-Olde. Fri. aug. 5- 60. SUB KATANGA The U N has dropped its plan - to send troops into Katanga, Province. Dag Hammarskjold, deciding - the situation in the Congo is too tense. Handing the problem back to the Security Council. The Secretary Genera, boarding a plane for New York, to take parting the coming debate. Hammarskjold acted on the advice of Ralph Bunche who received a very coid welcome in Elizabethville. REM Premier Tshombe, warning him that U N forces would have to fight their way into Katanga. Tshombe, backing up his threat - by closing down all the air fields in the Province. Parking military trucks - on the runways.

Bunche, considering the Katanga problem -hopeless. Guide Flying - to Leopoldville, Advising Hammarskjold to ask the Security Council - to deal with it. Advice, wit which the Secretary General has accepted.

KHRUSHCHEV

The note from Khrushchev to MacMillan - is called a carefully worded propaganda document; repeating all the phoney charges - about aggression by the West. But the boss of the Kremlin - adopts a moderate tone, and refers to a summit meeting which apparently Khrushchev still wants - after the American election.
