> Excitement in Moscow. The Kremlin announcing
today - it first manned space flight in seven months.

Showing movies of the launch - on Russian TV. The Soviets'

Soyuz-Nine spacecraft - carrying two cosmonauts into earth orbit; although their mission remains as yet - a closelyguarded secret.

By the way, U.S. astronaut Neil Armstrong - the
"first man on the moon" - was a visitor today in the Moscow area. Meeting with Soviet cosmonauts - in their home base at nearby Star City. However, the Soviet press virtually ignoring his arrival - which meant that only a scant few were aware of his presence.

War news from Southeast Asia tells today of an
attempt by enemy forces - to reclaim a major staging
area they recently fled. This in the Ba Thu area -inside Cambodia. Apparently the first step in a new threat aimed at Allied bases in South Vietnam's nearby Mekong Delta.

You may recall - the Ba Thu region serving as one
 Vietnamese operationsinside Cambodia. In fact, Allied troops reportedly killing a thousand Diet Cong - in three days of fighting there early last month. However, Allied forces have since been withdrawn - for the most part; and now the enemy in the words U.S. intellignece - attempting to "worm his way" back in.

Here on our own shores. The California White House
said today that U.S. air strikes inside Cambodia - will cease automatically with the withdrawal of U.S. ground troops. This, in effect, setting a June Thirtieth deadline

- for U.S. bombing russ in support of South Vietnamese forces operating in Cambodia; after which the Saigon troops
- if they choose to remain - would be strictly on their own.

At the same time though, the White House refusing to rule out completely - a possible later resumption of U.S. air strikes. Suggesting that, indeed, such would be the case- if U.S. troops in South Vietnam were ever again threatened by Communist activities in Cambodia.

Exactly twenty years ago this date - Senator

Margaret Chase Smith delivered her famous "Declaration
of Conscience" speech; thus becoming one of the first
in Congress - io attack publicly the tactics of Senator

Joseph McCarthy. Asserting at the time that "McCarthyism"
was sparked by "anti-intellectuals - who were mostly
guilty of know-nothing attitudes."
Now - Senator Smith speak f up again.

that anti-war militants and campus extremists - are ouliuco douay,
seemingly bent on "polarizing" the entire nation;
forcing the American people - to make a "narrow choice
More frith addlug:
between anarchy and repression. " "If that choice has to be made - make no mistake y, the American people will choose
repression - even if with reluctance and misgivings."

In the Middle East - the Is raeli border town of

Beisan near the Sea of Galilee - was hit by ten rockets today in less than minute. The misses fired by
guerillas - operating out of Jordan. One of the shells -
hitting an Israeli school yard; killing instantly a nine -year-
old girl - seriously injuring several of her playmates.

> This - promptly followed by a series of Israeli
air strikes; against targets in Jordan - also, Lebanon
and Egypt. Israeli Defense Minister Moshed Dayan - who
later visited Beisan - further threatening more to come.

Dayan asserting: "The terrorists don't mind killing children

- the Jordanians and Iraqis are helping them - so we are
hitting back."

Lima, Peru - the death toll in that Peruvian earthquake - still climbing, sharply: with the nation's
oldest newspaper - El Comercio - predicting today the figure may reach five thousand. The quake's path of destruction - covering an area more than six hundred miles, about a hundred and fifty miles wide. Stretching from the Pacific across the Andes - all the way to the Amazon.

PENTAGON
Here at home again - a report today that three
Russian Navy ships - have just passed within fifty miles of the Louisiana coastline. These including - according
( 0 to the Pentagon - a Russian sub, a guided missile cruiser and also an accompanying tanker. The three vessels comprising half of that Soviet task force - that earlier visited Havana. Now taking the long way home - via the Gulf of Mexico.
Elsewhere in Washington - the Supreme today
sidestepped another decision - dealing with the

Constitutionality of the death penalty. By a vote of six-
to-onefdelaying a consideration of the issues until the fall term; when - with the seating Justice-elect Harry Blackmun

* the High Tribunal presumably will again be at full
strength.

In other cases decided today -the Supreme Court
upheld the right of high school students 4 to wear their
hair "at any length or in any desired manner;" it also ruled
that a Federal Court may bar a labor walkout - if it
constitutes a violation of a bona-fide no-strike agreement.

This last reversing a previous supreme court ruling - /back to

Nineteen-Sixty-Two.
On Wall Street - the stock market took up again today - just about where it left off last week; with the Dow Jones industrials showing another healthy gain -
jumping nearly ten points. That makes a total increase of nearly eighty points - over the past four trading sessions.
