These are now mustered on the island of Formosa, and -- MacArthur would like to have the Chinese Sationalist troops thrown into the Eorean War -- according to the Congressman from Massachusetts.)

President Truman was asked today about the Rayburn statement yesterday -- Soviet soldiers in Korea -- third world war shaping up. He volunteered little information, merely that the speaker of the House is -- a truthful man.

The whole thing was dismissed with a smile the President noting that he has more information on
the war situation than any other person in the country.

But -- he has a better chance of getting concete information on the Kentucky Derby than on the war.

At the U N, another attempt at peace negatiations to end the Korean conflict. Today India and Egypt called a meeting of twelve countries, Arab and Asian, to draft a new appeal for a compromise. They are working out a formula, and the rumors are around that Red China may now be ready to talk terms.

American Congress voted -- increased armament to defend the Americas, and possibly help the U N.

Representatives of twenty-one Republics of the western hemisphere decided unanimously to build up their armaments, and place their defense programs at the disposal of the world organization -- to some degree at least. The whole thing is a bit vague -- but it does admit the possibility of using Latin American military forces to back up the U N.

a half billion dollars for national defense. In the message to Congress today he said that much would be needed to keep the armament program running. During the present fiscal year ending June Thirtieth.

When the White House budget went to Congress last January, the anticipation was that an extra Ten Billion would be needed. But now only six and a half billion. This is because the armament spending has not been running at the rate expected three months ago.

Word from Washington that Congress will kill the new liberal plan to defer college students from the draft. This is stated by Vinson of Georgia, Chairman of the Armed Services Committee of the House of Representatives. He said that, next week, the move will be made to toss out the scheme for keeping students in college instead of putting them in the armed forces.

Previously the committee had okayed the plan, but members now say they didn't realize how liberal it was -- as proposed by Draft Director Lewis B. Hershey. But now they are thermed that Under the Hershey plan college students of average ability would be deferred -- some eight hundred thousand. There have been complaints as that all this would mean -- the well-to-do exempted, while there of poorer families would be put into uniform.

verdict today - the death penalty imposed on Julius

Rosenberg and his wife Ethel. They were convicted

of having transmitted atomic secrets to Soviet Russia

all part of the widespread espionage which disclosed

to the Stalin Reds the secret of the bomb.)

When the time for sentencing came today, Federal Prosecutor Irving Saypol declined to make any recommendation to the court. He merely pointed out the gravity of the crime, the treason -- and noted that, under the law, the extreme penalty that could imposed. So that left it all together to Federal Judge Irving Kaufman, who thereupon spoke in a grave, slow voice, addressing the defendants. He told them that the crime of atomic espionage was worse than murder, and said: "In committing murder, the criminal only kills his victim. But, in your case, I believe your conduct. in putting into the hands of Russia secrets of the atomic bomb, has already caused the Communist

aggression in Korea. I believe, by your betrayal,"
the Judge went on, "you have altered the course of
history." Whereupon -- he pronounced the sentence of
death on the two Rosenbergs.

There was a third defendant, Morton Sobell, who was let off with a man lighter sentence -- thirty years in pix prison. Furthermore, sentence remains to be imposed on David Greenglass, brother of Mrs.

Rosenberg. He confessed his part in the spy plot -- and at the trial gave evidence against his sister and brother-in-law. Today the Federal Attorney asked for leniency in the case of Greenglass -- because of aid he gave the prosecution.

The two death sentences, imposed by the court are ordered for the week of May twenty-first -- and, under the law, they would be carried out in the state where the trial was held, New York, the electric chair at Sing Sing. But, an appeal will be taken and that will delay the executions, if the death penalties are upheld. If they are, it will be the

first case of capital punishment for espionage under American civil law.
