President Ford addressed a joint session of Congress tonight at nine o'clock - eastern time - in a speech expected to set the "spirit and tone" of the new administration's approach to domestic and foreign problems. It will be on both radio and TV. His top priority is inflation - what to do about it. Today he said he was "very disappointed" over G M's recent decision to raise prices on new model cars by ten percent. "It's essential" says the President, "that everyone exercise restraint in wage and price action."

According to Senator Goldwater one way to fight inflation would be a ten percent cut in all Federal salaries starting with the two hundred thousand a year the President

receives. Also, reduce salaries of members of Congress and the Military.

The President's priorities include choosing a new Vice President - hopefully by the end of this week. The list of those mentioned includes Mrs. Anne Armstrong of Texas - a counselor to former President Nixon and also former co-chairman of the Republican National Committee. The most prominently mentioned continue to be former New York Governor Rockefeller, G O P National Chairman George Mack Bush, Senator Goldwater, Elliott Richardson, Melvin Laird and Senator Edward Brooks of Massachusetts.

Former Attorney General John Mitchell today
asked for a delay in the Watergate cover-up trial claiming that with former President Nixon out of
Washington - the "nightmare of Watergate will diminish."
This, argues Mitchell's lawyer will give his client
a better chance for a fair trial.

The American Bar Association's President -Chesterfield Smith - spoke out today in favor of amnesty for those who refuse to serve in the Vietnam War. Addressing six thousand attorneys attending the association's annual meeting in Honolulu, Smith said -- "a citizen of a free country should not be forced to fight in a war that neither me he nor his elected representatives chose to initiate or declare." added: "as a full fledged Monday morning quarterback, I do have substantial sympathy ta for those who turned out to be right about the war long before I wassmith, estimated that thirty thousand to two hundred and thousand draft dodgers, many deserters are either living in exile or underground as fugitives, because of their war beliefs.
