The White House - an attempt today at a compromise with Senate investigators. Press Secretary Ron Ziegler telling of "ongoing communications" / with the Senate's special Watergate committee. This - said he - in hopes of arranging for testimony - by Presidential aides.

Ziegler adding that "everyone - is appalled by the Watergate burglary."

The White House also stated its opposition today to a bill aimed at making the FBI an independent agency.

Ziegler going on to note that Senator Kennedy of

Massachusetts - has taken the same position. "I don't
mention that to ally myself with him" - said Ziegler - "only
to show that there is bipartisan opposition."

In the Middle East - at Beirut - a shakeup today in the Lebanese government. Premier Saeb Salam handing in his resignation - week the refusal of President Suleiman Franjieh to fire his Army Commander. The latter blamed by Salam - for failing to thwart that Israeli raid on Beirut.

Beirut again - Palestinian guerilla leader Yasser

Arafat - pledging a swift response to the Israeli attack.

"Nothing is lost by waiting" - said he. Adding: "The reply will be terrible."

Reverse side - Jerusalem - Israeli Defense Minister

Moshe Dayan - was telling of a new strategy. The Israelis

will concentrate, henceforth - said he - on a policy of

pre-emptive rather than retaliatory action.
