The House voted today to give President Eisenhower almost complete authority to order whatever he thinks necessary for the defense of Formosa. The majority was one of the largest ever polled in the history of the Chamber -- four hundred The three dissenters, were Representatives and nine to three. Barden of North Carolina, Siler of Kentucky, and Sheehan of T'l'inois. Today's session was a very solemn one. Leaders of both Parties, calling for a demonstration of American unity in the face of the crisis caused by the Chinese Reds. The Chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, Congressman James Richards of South Carolina, warned that the resolution could lead to war - but that the choice is up to the Communists. Chairman Richards also told his colleagues that no one should support the motion - unless he was ready to accept all the consequences.

Other speakers generally agreed with Ric rds - that to gime Fresident the powers he wanted could be dangerous, on that it was necessary to let Mao Tse-tung know that there is to doubt about our defending Formosa. The Chinese Dictator

and nine to three.

The Senate will vote on the motion before the end of this week. It's virtually sure of passing there too although probably not by so tremendous a majority as the Nouse gave its

RUSSIA

Russia ends its state of war with Germany. A decree by the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet states that "peaceful relations are being established." The decree, signed by Marshal Voroshilov, Chairman of the Presidium.

The news was given out by Redio Moscow - at the same time that the press chief of the Foreign Ministry was handing newsmen the text of the decree.

The decree complains of the rearming of West Germany. Then # goes on to say that the state of war between the Soviet Union and Germany is now over. That all restrictions on German citizens as belonging to an elient state, are now at an end. But, the decree emphasizes that there is no end to Germany's international obligations.

Western observers in Moscow are not clear just what the results of this decree will be. They point out that the remark about German obligations - could mean almost anything that the Kremlin wants it to mean.

But officially, today's announcement ended the state

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of war that began in Nineteen Forty-One, when Hitler's armies invaded Russia. It took almost fourteen years to get back to the status quo.

The leader of the West German Socialists warned today that his Party will do everything it can to block the ratification of the Paris Agreements on German rearmament until further talks have been held with the Russians on the question of German reunification. Socialist Leader Eric Ollenhauer spoke over the radio in behalf of his Party's anti-rearmament campaign. He bitterly criticized the government of Chancellor Adenauer - for failing to take seriously Kremlin threats to keep Germany permanently divided, if the Germans were rearmed. The Socialist leader called on the Chancellor to negotiate further with Malenkov.

Diplomats in Bonn say it's certain that the Chancellor will reject this proposal.

STALIN

A British expert on the Soviet Union believes that Josef Stalin died a natural death - but that the colleagues of the Dictator were responsible. How does thet make sense? ECONOMICS

This country is in the midst of a moderate economic advance. So say two federal agencies - the Commerce Department and the Federal Reserve Board. The agencies add that there are two big reasons for present prosperity - the automobile industry, with its new popular models, and the marketing of more household appliances like T.V. sets and washing machines.

ARCTIC

A new radio station in the Far North - on the tundra - inside the Arctic Circle - maybe. The Canadians fear Red Moscow may spread propaganda among the Eskimos and the Indians, of Far Northern Canada. A member of the Northwest Territories Council points out that Radio Moscow's short wave program can be picked up along the Arctic Circle much easier than Canadian programs. So, CBC engineers are at work on the problem.

COSTA RICA

The last batch of rebels has crossed the border from Costa Rica into Nicaragua. So reported from the Costa Rican capital of San Jose. Observers for the Organization of American States declare they saw the rebels leave the former "buffer zone" along the frontier of the two countries. And the Costa Rican Foreign Minister states that this is the end of the revolution that began two weeks ago today.

The rebels are now interned in Nicaragua - including their leader, former Costa Rican President, Rafael Guardia.

But the Nicaraguan government does not seem convinced that the incident is all over. Mobilization has been ordered, and government controlled newspapers are calling for action against the President of Costa Rica, Jose Figueres. Nicaraguan troops are still on the border, and Nicaraguan planes are patrolling the area. Nicaraguan The Nicaraguan Radio has broadcast a warning that border violations will not be tolerated. LOCUSTS

Morocco suffering from one of the oldest plagues known to man - a plague of locusts. That type of plague mentioned in the Bible, has repeatedly descended upon North Africa to cause widespread destruction.

Eleven weeks ago, the latest horde of locusts bore down on French Morocco. The beginning of a new seven year ENE cycle. Coming from the interior of Africa, they usually are stopped by the Sahara Desert and the Atlas Mountains. But this time, the wind blew them across both desert and mountains - on into Morocco.

Some of the swarms are twenty miles long and ten miles wide. The Arabs call them "the red typhoon" because they obscure the sun, and its rays are filtered through their red wings, producing a blinding glare that looks like fire.

The locusts will strip an orange tree completely bare in ten minutes - and destroy thirty acres of tomatoes miles even sooner. They've already devastated three hundred ma LOCUSTS - 2

fertile land - ruining thousands of Arab farmers.

So far, nothing here over able to stop the locusts. The authorities brought in thousands of men, hundreds of trucks, eighty planes, and forty helicopters. All these forces were used to spray the area with insecticides. But even flame throwers have not been able to end the scourge.

It's become so bad, that the farmers have given up and corf their faith in modern technology . They be described as returning to the methods of their forefathers - beating on drums and kettles, and lighting ritual fires, in the hope of frightening the locusts.

But that hasn't worked either. And now the authorities say there's only one hope of a quick end to the plague - a sudden change in the weather. Either a sudden cold to wave that would freeze the locusts, or eller a strong wind that to to how them out to sea. In the meantime, Morocco has to would blow them out to sea.
