Diomede Islands in Bering Strait. They were turned back -- and by kr whom That's the interesting part of it -- an Eskimo scout patrol. Probably the
incident is of no importance. But it is interesting
-- the eskimo, in the service of the U.S. intercepting the Soviet party moving across the ice toward Alaska.

The U.S. Marines have recaptured the orincioal position they lost last night. The hill they call Vegas. They stormed up the slopes and wiped out the Reds in a stubborn battle.

This, in the Bunker Hill sector, on an invasion route to Seoul.

The Chinese made a whole series of
xxxii assaults, and drove the leathernecks off two hills. The one -- called Vegas; hemet sounds as if it might be named for -- Las Vegas. The more likely, because the other summit is called, Reno. Sours if Some soldiers from Nevada have been around those parts.

In the counter attack, the Marines left Reno alone and concentrated on the other strong point -- the more important. The first attack was c necked by violent mortar and cannon fire. But the other went through. It took the leathernecks eight hours to battle their way up the slope of Vegas,

but they made it. The assault commander of the Marines sent back a radio message: "We're on top". To which ne added the old slogan of the leathernecks:
"The situation is well in hand."

## FOLLOWZKOREA MARINES

The latest, the Marines have been driven back from the hill called Vegas.

A strange exploit of war reported from
the sector of Old Baldy, the strategic hill captured by the Reds -- and held by them in days of bitter fighting. American counter attacks -- repelled; But now we are told of a patrol starting out from our lines making its way to the summit of Old Baldy, the heart of the enemy position. The patrol was a mere ten man affair, eight Americans and two South Koreans. At night, they made their way through a system of trenches looking warily for the enemy. But they didn't find any, as they crept on and on -- up the slope of Old Baldy. The strategic hill seemed deserted.

The commander of the patrol was a young
officer, Steven Boyle of Newark, New Jersey, who had been promoted to First Lieutenant only yesterday.

He says: "Our job was to get into a fire fight." Which in $G$ parlance is -- a battle with small arms. Re ques on,
"We crawled all the way over the crest" "and it was
not until we got to the reverse slope that we found

any Reds to fight."

They came upon a force of Chinese asleep, and blasted them with grenades and machine gun fire. Then the patrol of eight Americans and two South Koreans turned back and came home safely.

The only explanation would seem to be -- that the tremendous bombardment, artillery and air, that hit Old Baldy yesterday, had made the Reds get out, for the time being at least.

On
At the UN, Soviet Russia served notice today -there will be no investigation of those crazy charges of germ warfare in Korea, unless Communist China and Horth Korea partici ate in the proceedings. The American delegation is pressing for an impartial inquiry -- to scotch, once and for all the vicious propaganda. But, if the Asiatic Reds are not let in, the Soviet will veto.

The Chinese Nationalists on Formosa
disclaim all responsibility for the chinese troops in Burma. This, in reply to the protest the Burmese government has placed before the J N. Today, a spokesman on Formosa said: "The Nationalist troops in Burma form no part of the armed forces of the Chinese Government. The Chinese Government exercises no control whatsoever over them." So states the spokesman for Ching Kail Sher.
(The word is that the Nationalists,) refusing
to take any oronsibility for the Nationalists in
Burma will reject a proposal made by Thailand, Siam. The Government at Bangkok enounces that it will permit the Chinese troops to pass through Thailand -- if they wish to get out of Burma and go to Formosa. But -- they must be disarmed, before they are-permited to pore into Siamedoritory-

Bangkok says, further, that the plan could be carried all out, only if countries agreed, including Soviet Russia.

That might provide a solution of the
problem. But now we hear -- the Ching Kali Sher regime wont have it.)

News from Moscow tonight features the word -- amnesty. The Moscow government, under new Premier Malenkov, has ordered the release of thousands of prisoners -- though not political prisoners. The amnesty decree turns loose all convicts sentenced to five years or less, all pregnant women and mothers of small children, and elderly prisoners. They go free, regardless of the lengths of their terms.

It isn't clear what this may mean -but we may note that, in past history, it has been the custom of despot governments to decree an amnesty, when a new overlord takes power.

## CZECHOSLOVAKIA

Red Czechoslovakia made a demand on the United States today -- insisting on the return of the Czech airliner that flew to western Germany, the American zone, last Monday. The Reds at Prague, also demand that we hand over what they call "the terrorists". That is, the crew of theplane which made the break through the Iron Curtain -- in a flight for $\mathrm{x} \boldsymbol{x}$ freedom.

There is mention, of the passengers,
aboard the crowded airliner. Some of these have asked for political asylum. Others, want to return to their native country. There were twenty-nine persons
aboard the plane, and it EEER doesn't seem quite clear how many want to go back.

The Senate, the this afternoon, confirmed
the nomination of Charles E. Bohlen as Ambassador to Russia $\sqrt{-- \text { the vote }-- \text { seventy -four to thirteen. }}$ Which accorded closely with predictions made by Senator Taft of Ohio -- who said there would not be more than a dozen votes cast against the
nomination backed so strongly by President Eisenhower. $\nu_{B}$ But the debate was bitter to the end -- with

Senator Dirksen of Illinois making a xt last minute
attack. He had/acid remarks (or those/ Republican Senators who criticized the Bohlen appointment,
yet voted okay because Bohlen was the choice of the President.
(The thirteen Senators voting against
included two Democrats -- Johnson of Colorado and NeCarran of Nevada.)

The result is a decided victory for the
White House -- in the first clash between President Eisenhower and Republican opposition in Congress, that (Roberts should have stepped out "a long time ago". The National Chairman was charged with lobbying activities, and Landon declares: "the influence of the national chairman for good or for evil demands a man of the highest character and stature.

## VOLCANO

Thundering disaster and frey peril --
at a remote island in the waters off Southern Asia. The government of Indonesia has received an urgent appeal for help-- following a tremendous volcanic eruption on the island of Sumba. That's near Bali, famous for dances and those Balinese beauties. A message from Bali states that on Tuesday $\boldsymbol{x} \boldsymbol{x}$ mountain exploded. The volcano Sang Yang. Two thousand inhabitants of nearby villages fled to the seashore, where they remained huddled and helpless. Sang Yang hurhing/a torrent of volcanic debris and a flood of molten lava, threatening to engulf the entire island of Sumba.

Ext Today's dispatch from those distant
latitudes tells of a fleet of boats on their way, sent by the Indonesian Navy -- to take off the refugees from the terror of sang yang on the island of the fire mountain. Sang yang singing

(Police| firemen, civilian defense workers and volunteers are on the rescue job -- getting people out by boat. The Coast Guards, brought from the sea coast, are using amphibious ducks.

In New Hampshire, the fear is that the floods may be as bad as in Nineteen Thirty-Six when the damage was eighteen million dollars. But the worst of all is the Andro'scoggin River in Maine - where the deluge is the more vicious because of three million feet of logs. That's timber country, and the immense mass of logs had been held back by a barrier, a boom. But the pressure of the flood waters became so great that

So, instead, Oklahoma $A$ and $M$ promises to reform, athletically speaking, and Ex give more attention to the lofty realms of scholarship.
