PARIS

On the peace front at Paris - the social amenities of the past were still lacking today. No greetings - no smiling - no handshakes. But they were talking. Henry Kissinger conferring with Hanoi's Le Duc Tho - for a second day in a row. Today's session - lasting six hours; followed immediately by technical talks - on a lower level. Kissinger and Tho - also agreeing to meet again tomorrow.

Elsewhere in Paris - France's President

Pompidou was holding a news conference; expressing

regret - over renewed U.S. bombing; also, saying that

he hopes "this time" - the peace talks "will succeed."

He added, however the problems that still separate the

two sides - "are not non-existent, but real."

Meanwhile, in Vietnam, a second straight day of concentrated U.S. bombing attacks - in the Central Highlands. American B-Fifty-Twos dumping, in all, more than twenty-five hundred tons of explosives - on suspected enemy targets. An attempt - we are told - to head off an expected major offensive - against Kontum City.

From Saigon - a report that U.S. bombers are still free to strike - above the twentieth parallel; but only if such an attack - constitutes "protective reaction." A spokesman adding that this policy "has always been in effect - is now in effect - and always will be in effect."

The new head man at the Pentagon - was called today to Capitol Hill. Defense Secretary-designate Elliot Richardson - testifying before the Senate Armed Services Committee. There expressing his "full confidence in and support" of - the President's military actions in Vietnam. Richardson adding that the President's main objective remains that "of securing peace - with a minimum risk of jeopardizing the preservation of that peace."

The White House - President Nixon met today with three of his top advisers. Treasury Secretary George

Shultz - Chairman Herbert Stein of the President's Council of Economic Advisers - and domestic chief of staff John

Ehrlichman. The White House later saying they discussed ways and means - of extending and perhaps improving present wage and price controls.

The White House also announced today that the

President will not deliver his State of the Union message

this year - in person to Congress. Secretary Ron

Ziegler explaining that such an appearance - would follow

closely the President's second inaugural address. Adding,

therefore, the President would submit his State of the Union

message - in the form of a written report.

STAFF FOLLOW WHITE HOUSE

Earlier, the President received from his staff a bouquet of sixty roses in honor of his sixtieth birthday.

The President briefly inviting reporters into his office to gaze on the sight. "Sixty of them" - said he. Adding:
"Do you know how much roses cost?"

Coming up tonight - a small family dinner. By the way, the President saying his best advice at age sixty - is "never to slow down, stay mentally alert, and keep interested in life."

The U.S. wholesale price index - was up sharply last month. An increase of one-point-eight per cent - according to government figures announced today; the biggest monthly jump - since Nineteen-Fifty-One; due mainly to higher prices - for food and other farm products.

When asked for comment though - the White House quickly ruling out the possibility of price controls on raw agricultural products. Press Secretary Ron Ziegler saying the problem at the wholesale level - is simply "one of supply."

At New Orleans - an official day of mourning today; in memory of the six persons, including three policemen - who were killed in that sniper attack of yesterday.

At the same time - a continuing attempt to fathom
the mystery of it all. Police Superintendent Clarence
Giarrusso - telling of tests on the rifle found near the body
of sniper Mark Essex; saying it was found to be the same
weapon - that was used to kill a police cadet and wound
another officer just a week ago.

Giarrusso also saying there was evidence - that

Essex did not act alone. "There seems to be some evidence

ofa conspiracy" - said he. Adding: "By a conspiracy,

I mean two, three or four - a small number that were intent

on killing people."

The Federal Aviation Administration cracked down
hard today - on airport operators at Aspen, Colorado Tyler, Texas - Marquette, Michigan - and Prescott, Arizona. All four - accused of failing to comply with strict
new anti-hijacking regulations; accordingly, fined a Thousand
Dollars a day - starting as of last Sunday. The FAA
adding that said fines will continue to accrue at a Thousanda-day - pending full compliance.

From the U.S. Food and Drug Administration - a report today on the merits of bottled drinking water; said to show that fully eight per cent of such water - has been found to have an excessive bacteria count.

The FDA also notes that there are, at present - no addenational standards for bottled drinking water; but parties that it plans to take care of that little oversight - within sixty days.

The first few weeks of winter in Russia - warmest in twenty-three years. So warm, in fact - that mushrooms were said to be growing in the woods. And farmers were warning of potential damage to winter crops - for lack of snow, double
