GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

The Russians claim to have won the earth satellite race.

Moscow Radio's English language broadcast was picked
up in London this evening, announcing that Russia has launched an earth satellite.

The announcement, if it pans out to be true, means that Soviet scientists by some months beat the United States to what is believed to be the most significant scientific development since the development of the atomic bomb.

The most recent Washington announcements have indicated that the launching of an American earth satellite is still many months away.

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Somewhere above the earth tonight, there revolves an artificial moon - a man-made earth satellite.

The Russians announced tonight that they had won the earth satellite race - the race for perhaps the greatest scientific achievement since man split the atom.

The Russian official news agency said that they rocketed into space the first earth satellite some time earlier today, and that at this moment it is circling our world on an elliptical pattern. And that it can be observed with an ordinary telescope.

The Russians say their instrument is just under two feet in diameter, weighs 185 pounds and is circling the globe every hour and 35 minutes, at an altitude of 560 miles.

They gave its rough course, and American experts say it will apparently cross the skies over the United Sates, passing for instance, almost directly over Nev York City.

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The satellites two radios are said to be
transmitting regular signals, and the Russians announced the wave lengths.

They said the duration of the satellites stay in
the heavens could not be predicted, but that when it did fall out of the skies it would disintigrate, burn itself up, when it reentered the earth's atmosphere.

The Russian achievement beat by many months the American earth satellite team. We have tested only components of the complicated rockets necessary to launch the satellites. Our experts had predicted we would launch our first satellite, about the same size as the Russian one, only simetime next spring.

Tonight quick congratulations went to the Russians
from Dr. Lloyd Berkner, an American official of the International Geophysical Year - a highlight of which was to be this satellite program. Berkner extended his congratulations directly to Russian scientists, present

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at Geophysical Year cocktail party in Washington.
Berkner also called into action American teams
organized to spot artificial satellites, and he expressed the hope the Russians would share with us enough
knowledge to enable our watchers to participate in the Russian program.

Tonight Communist Poland is racing another massive rebellion. An estimated twenty thousand rioters - raging through the streets of Warsaw. They're calling for an end to the Gomulka regime.

It began with students at Warsaw University. They
were joined by workers, and even housewives. The police tried
to keep order - by charging into demonstrations - swinging
clubs. But the rioters fought back - and as soon as one
group was dispersed - another would spring up.

Gomulka was successful in defying the Russians taking Poland along a path to Communism, that he marked out. Tonight the question is - whether the Poles are willing to take any path to Communism.

The former heir apparent to Marshal Tito - went on
trial in Yugoslavia today. Milovan Djilas, author of the book,
"The New Class" - a scathing indictment of Communism as the
modern form of tyranny. Newsmen were expelled from the court before the defendant began his defense. But as they were
leaving, they heard Djilas declare, "Every word in my book -
is the truth."
Well, it's kind of mrame Tito doesn't want to hear.
The Yugoslav Dictator, demanding a jail sentence for his one-time companion. The decision of the court, to be handed down tomorrow - and it could bring Djilas twenty years.in prison.

At Miami Beach, the expected happened today. The Teamsters Union, electing James R. Hoffa as its new president. About the only unexpected thing - was the size of Hoffa's victory. He was carried into office by a landslide. He polled one thousand, two hundred and eight votes -- on the f'irst ballot. In second place, William Lee - with three hundred and thirteen. Bringing up the rear, Thomas Haggerty who had a hundred and forty.

Well, Hoffa certainly was right - when he confidently predicted his election. But the Senate Rackets Committee has stepped in - to find out just how it was done. The Committee, serving a subpoena on the Credentials Committee of the Union - demanding to see the minutes, and other records. The Committeed has already/charged that the selection of delegates - rigged the election in Hofta's favor. And tonight Chairman McClellan called Hof'fa's triumph - a challenge to Congress, to clean out criminal elements in labor.
President Eisenhower is back in Gettysburg - after
an unexpected flight from Washington correspondents were caught flat-foled - when White House Press Secretary, Jim Hagerty, announced the trip. The correspondents were still packing their bags in Washington, when the

Yesterday Governor McKeldin of Maryland asked the
federal government - to tell everything it knows about the Little Rock situation. The Maryland Governor asking, "Who started the rumor - about prospective violence?" McKeldin thinks the best way to get to the bottom - would be to publish the findings of the F.B.I.

The answer of the Justice Department is that the reports were submitted to Judge Davies personally. And it's up to him to release them - if he sees fit.

The Public Health Service estimates - two hundred thousand new cases of influenza broke out last week - in states,
all the way from Guorgia to California. This makes almost half a million patients - since the first marartact case of reached
Asian flu ind this country. The schools, are articularly hard hit. In some places, student absenteeism has batt reached eighty-three per cent. And New York Health officials say the City may be in for a full scale attack of Asian flu - during October.

Throughout the nation, doctors give one main reason for the epidemic - the flu came before enough vaccine was produced to deal with it.

The Agriculture Department today issued a special
report - asking farmers to hold down the production of pigs.

The report declares - next Spring might see a seven per cent
increase - in pork on the hoof. The reason - a bumper crop of grain - has reduced the cost of feed gxain for livestock.

As always, there's more to this farm problem than
merely economics. A seven per cent increase in hogs - would
mean a collapse in retail prices for bacon, ham, and pork.

The delegation will visit London, Amsterdam, Cologne, Lucerne, Rome, Milan, and Paris. At each stop, they'll drop off special editions of the Harrisburg "Patriot".

The editions, in English, German, Italian and French.

The contents mainly a description of life in

Pennsylvania.

This tour is the biggest ever organized under the Eisenhower Plan for Closer Contacts between Americans and the rest of the world.

The sixty nation "Atoms for Peace" pool today named Congressman Sterling Cole, of New York - as its Director selected
General. Cole, by the Board of Directors - will have to be approved by the general conference - but approval is considered certain.

Congressman Cole is the former Chairwan of the

Congressional Joint Atomic Energy Committee. He was in close touch with the White House - when President Eisenhower made the dramatic proposal - for international exploitation of nuclear power for peace-time purposes.

The San Marino story - becomes more like a comic
opera libretto all the time. The world's smallest nation, entirely surrounded by Italy - is supposed to be having a civil war. But it's the kind of war in which no one gets shotalthough there have been some casualties.

## CANADA

The two-day conference of Canadian and British financial experts in Ottawa - has ended. There's no decision on a key British proposal - for a new free trade area between the two countries. But there is agreement on a three point program.

- First, Canada will try to buy more British goods instead of going to non-commonwealth countries. Secondly, Canada will revise her tariff to help British imports. And finally, a high level Canadian trade delegation will go to London - to try to work out closer cooperation between Canada and Britain - on the financial level.

Gambling is a major social problem - in Puerto Rico.

So says Governor Luis Munoz Marin. The Governor, speaking just before he signed a number of bills today. Bills cutting down
on dog racing, car racing, and other forms of sports. He
says that last year Puerto Ricans gambled nearly ten million
dollars in legalized betting. The figure, jumping to one hundred million - if illegal gambling is included. Which is, according to the Governor - almost half of Puerto Rico's entire budget.

He thinks betting has become a national scandal and he wants something done about it. Today's laws are the first step toward cutting down on the amount of money thrown kitties into every year by the people of Puerto Rico.

Out in the Azores, Faial Island is threatened with
the fate of Pompeii. That undersea volcano, erupting more furiously than ever. It's already built a small island of
lava - that has spread to within a hundred and fifty yards of Faial. The volcano, throwing molten rock and deadly ash thousands of feet into the air. The whole area, covered with poisonous gases.

The only thing that has saved Faial Island so far -
is the wind. A persistent southeasterly - is carrying the vapor out to sea. But the twenty-five thousand inhabitants
of the island - will be in deadly danger - should the wind change. And at the same time, that samiof molten lava pushes closer - through a hissing, boiling sea.

Today, a plane-load of scientists flew in to

Faial - to see whether the island ought to be evacuated.

A friend of the late Admiral Richard E. Byrd -
announces plans for a flight around the world - over the North and South Poles. William Savage, saying he wants to lead the first expedition to circumnavigate the globe by air from north to south, instead of east to west.

There's one snag. The U.S. Navy has turned thumbs asked
down on the idea. Savage aska for Commander Frederick Dustin
to lead the expedition. Dustin, a member of all the Byrd expeditions. Also, the plane was supposed to stop off at our McMurdo Sound base, near the Ross Sea.

The Navy refuses both requests. It says Commander

Dustin has other duties. And there's not enough fuel at

McMurdo Sound - to allow for refueling.

Today Savage said the flight would take place anyway -
financed by a group of American businessmen. Their flight
plan is to leave Boston around November Tenth. They'll fly
Antarctic south by way of Trinidad and Buenos Aires - to the Soublowedar then over the South Pole. continent, They'll come back by way of New Zealand, Melbourne,

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Manila, Tokyo, Anchorage - then across the North Pole to our base at Thule, in Greenland.

The first p..ane to land in the Antarctic this year has just returned to its base at Christ Church, New Zealand. A navy Skymaster, piloted by Commander Harold Hanson, of Inglewood, California.

Commander Hanson flew his plane on a round trip of almost five thousand miles. It was a rescue mission. The To Skymaster, returning Christ Church with ten injured men from "Operation Deep Freeze."

The Skymaster also brought the first mail for McMurdo Sound - in seven months. Which was the main thing the men down there were waiting for. Says Co-Pilot Alfred Gay, of Brockton, Massachusetts - "Those McMurdo men went wild when we started tossing out the mail bags."
