In the California desert near the Edwards Air Force
base - first fatality today in eight years of research with the X-Fifteen rocket ship; world's fastest-flying highest -flying -- manned aircraft.

Whatever happened - it happened fifty miles up.

Air Force Major Michael Adams at the controls - in the midst of an altitude test; when the ship suddenly nosed over -plunging, down, down, down to the desert floor.

Major Adams - a combat veteran of the Korean War.

Air Force officials saying he apparently was unable to trigger his ejection system - or else he tried too long to save his stricken craft.

For nearly two weeks now - the Vied Cong have

This in a series of four separate mortar attacks -
