EISENHOWER LT-Delco. Fri. Jan. 9th 1959,

President Eisenhower in his state of the union message, covers domestic and international problems, in general terms, - leaving specific proposals to be spelled out - in later messages to Congress.

Here's one important quote **** the *** The recession is fading into history."

Meaning - we are solvent enough to pay for everything we need, including national defense - and our big *** missile** program.

Nevertheless he urges those now in control of Congress - the Democrats - to help keep spending down.

He suggests fewer farm subsidies, control of labor racketeering, and acceptance of the Supreme Court order on integration.

Twice he made special reference to the Russians.

First, after saying our own Americak rocket science is

first rate - he complimented the Russians on what they have achieved.

Turning to disarmament, he was less complimentary.

In fact he castigated the Kremlin for treating international agreements as "mere scraps of paper:. This an obvious reference to the Potsdam declaration on Berlin - which Khrushchev now wants to tear up.

Most of the President's proposals are supported by both Republicans and Democrats in Congress - exception on the question of civil rights. The southerners are not happy about that. Senator Talmadge of Georgia says he is only dividing the nation by insisting on integration.

Some members of Congress want to spend more - than this state of the union message calls for. Others feel the administration is wrong - about farm price supports. And there's some criticism - about education. But the general view on Capitol Hill is - that President Eisenhower has given them a real lead. Something to work on - in this session of Congress.

MIKOYAN

The Soviet Deputy Premier in a chatty mood - in Chicago. Mikoyan, unruffled by eggs - thrown at him, laughing and joking with newsmen, terming the picket and egg incident "a comedy." Not surprised. Said he expected to run into something like that - during his tour of America.

But Mikoyan also then went on to deny that his government is changing its position on Germany. He also brought up the old Communist line - about the withering away of capitalism. Admitting - "history takes time," he added that Khrushchev is right - in predicting America will go Communist some day.

Today's vote in the Senate means - a setback for the enemies of the filibuster. Senators Anderson of New Mexico and Clark of Pennsylvania had proposed - that all Senate rules be carried over from the last congress - **E* except the rule about the filibuster. The Anderson-Clark motion - opposed by Democratic leader Lyndon Johnson. Then voted down - sixty to thirty six.

Senator Johnson's compromise proposal - seems to be

Q that
getting more support. That compromise would change the Senate
rule - allowing two thirds of the Senators present - to vote

down a filibuster.

In Havana, they re asking - "is the Cuban revolution really over?"

If it isn't that's because of a split in the ranks of the rebels. Today Fidel Castro warned - "the greatest crime is - to kra break the peace." And President Urrutia ordered am arms to be taken - from everybody except authorized personnel.

The point is - weapons, disappearing suddenly. In one place, raiders got away with - five www. hundred rifles and machine guns. The xi raiders, apparently an independent group - who took part in the rebellion. These independents - helping to overthrow Battista. Now threatening - to overthrow Fixel Castro. Who asks - "are we going to return to the times of gun battles in the streets?"

The Kingdom of Laos - in Indo-China reports - a

Communist invasion. Three thousand Reds as from North Viet

Nam - driving across the border. Getting nine miles into

Laos. No fighting yet - but the ind invaders are digging in.

The laotian government believes - this invasion is more political than military. The Viet Namese, trying to encourage the home grown Reds of Laos. Start a Communist uprising - maybe.

Britain and Egypt will get together - to discuss

Suez. That is - the financial claims arising from - the

Anglo-French invasion of Nineteen Fifty-Six. American Eugene

Black, headof the World Bank - worked out the preliminaries

during his talks in the Egyptian capital. Today, kack Black

told newsmen - "not many points remain to be settled". The

rest - up to London and Cairo.

The reason for the plane crash in Tennessee is unknown. Pilot Robert Gollmier was only minutes away from
a landing - at the Tri-Cities airport, near Bluff City. He
radioed he was coming in -for an instrument landing. That
was the last the control tower heard from him. Minutes later,
his airliner smaked into - Iron Mountain. No survivors of

The Spanish Dam that collapsed today - was only two years old. Built as part of - a hydro-electric power project. But it wasn't strong enough to hold back the rear reservoir - rising under torrential rains.

Suddenly the dam gave way - with a roar that could be heard across the mountains. The water, pouring out - in a solid wave. Then racing down - a steep, narrow ravine.

Tearing up trees, smashing buildings - swerwhelming one village. The villagers, asleep, when millions of tons of water hit them. The entire town - swept away. Many victims - drowned in their beds. Others, caught by the flood - as they raced for the hills. The toll - around a hundred known dead.

Another hundred - missing.

There's an old question - that's becoming a new problem. How high is up? Correspondent Terry Ferrer of the New York Herald Tribune points out - that space rockets are producing legal riddles.

So I put the question to Dr. Herbert Friedman - of the Naval Research Laboratory in Washington. Recently we were together on an I G Y expedition to Danger Island in the South Pacific.
