The White House - another milestone in East

West relations. The US and Russia reaching agreement

today - on a new comprehensive trade pact; in the process,

settling at last - Russia's lend-lease debt from World War

Two, with the official signing - later on at the State

Department. Secretary of State Rogers - calling this "a

very historic day for both countries." Officials adding that

US and Russian trade is now expected to hit a billion and a

half within three years; in other words - nearly triple its

present volume.

Along the coast of Alaska - the search for the missing plane goes on - the plane carrying house Majority

Leader Hale Boggs - Alaska's congressman Nick Behich - and two others. Today that part of the state was covered by freezing drizzle, also heavy fog; making aerial search extremely difficult. For the first time a ground team moving in - a team of ten rangers hiking into the rugged Portage Pass country east of Anchorage, where the plane was last heard from.

The Air Force has had some forty planes, with more than a hundred Alaskan private pilots taking part.
