In Paris, the Vest makes a quick retort, answering
Soviet Russia. Yesterday Vishinsky, with scorn and contumely,
rejected the Western proposals for disarmament. So today,
the United States, Great Britain and France sent a joint
invitation to the Chancellor of Western Germany, asking him
to come to Paris, to talk about - German soldiers for

General Eisenhower's Western European Army. An inquiry will
be put to Chancellor Adenauer - just how soon will German
troops be available for Western defense against Red aggression?
Which is a pointed reply to Vishinsky's diatribe - for Soviet

Russia is known to be most apprehensive of a rearmed Germany.
In addition to which - the Steering Committee of
the General Assembly voted today for a full debate on
political conditions in the Soviet Zone of Germany. This
arises from Red propaganda demanding a united Germany. We
agree on condition of a free election - united Germany to true
choose its fix government in a democratic way. So the Western powers have asked the U.N. to make an investigation -

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and decide whether or not free elections will be possible in
the Soviet Zone.
(In the Steering Committee, the vote was - twelve to
two. The two in opposition were - Communist votes. Which
might have been expected - Moscow being dead against anything
like U.N. investigations or democratic elections.

At the Allied truce camp in Korea, our negotiators were, today, in conference with General Ridgway. The Supreme Commander flew from Tokyo to talk things over - as the truce team prepared for its seventeenth meeting with Red emissaries.

General Ridgway was there in anticipation of a possible shift by the enemy - following yesterday's news that Vishinsky, at the U.N. General Assembly in Paris, had called for an armistice line along the Thirty-eighth Parallel. Last night we heard the supposition that this might be a signal for the Chinese and Korean Reds to go hack to their original demand -Thirty-eighth Parallel.
(All of which might seem the more likely, from the way the Red negotiators acted yesterday. In the truce talks, they were obviously stalling, as if waiting for word from higher up. They seemed undecided, as if waiting for Vishinsky to have his say in Paris.

All of which created an air of uncertainty and
vagueness - as our negotiators made ready for another

## KOREA - WAR

The principal war news is - new battles of jet planes
in Korean skies. There were two dogfights today - with


Communist planes were shot down, four damaged.
On the ground, little to report. The presence of
Red armor seems to hint at a new Communist offensive - but nothing materialized today.

In Cairo, today, the call for a holy war was proclaimed - by radio. Which certainly put a modern angle on something as old as the Koran, itself. Down through Moslem history, the cry has rung out - Jihad, holy war. Which often has meant fear and peril - far and wide. In Egypt, quarreling with Britain, fanatics have been yelling that ancient summons, and now the government-controlled radio takes up the shout - Jihad.

Today was the Mohammedan sabbath, which is on Friday.
To the microphone came Sheikh Mohammed Abu Shedida - Iman
of the Mosque of Al Hussein. He went on the air with customary

Moslem prayers, to which he added a political harangue. He
called on Egyptians to drive the British from the Suez Canal
Zone, and summoned them to - a holy war, Jihad.
Well, it's all according to the Koran and the

Prophet Mohammed, who authorized the faithful to resort to the
sword against the infidel. But never before has the Jihad been proclaimed officially - on the radio.

Governor Warren $\Lambda^{\text {will }}$, announce next week - whether or not he will seek the Republican nomination for president.

This is in response to a request from seventeen G.O.P. leaders

In California, who urged the Governor to declare himself a candidate. Previously, Earle Warren had not intended to make any decision until early in Nineteen Fifty-two. Today he said the letter from the Republican leaders has made him change his mind, and he will make an announcement in a few days - next week.

## CONFEDERATE FLAG

Washington news about flying the Confederate flag brings a bit of comment from the Library of Congress, which may surprise a few people. They dare not flying the Confederate flag at all.

Recently, the police at the Capital have
been making drivers remove the rebel emblem of the Old South from their cars. Because, there's (a /rand law which forbids anything but the Stars and Stripes to be displayed on the Capital grounds.

The fad for the Southern Confederacy has bean maybe,

Confederate flag. The Library of Congress explains that the fardean banner with diagonal stripes of blue
against a field of red - is really the Confederate

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"battle emblem" The official flag was changed three times, and fer people would recognize it. The first version, for example, had three horizontal bars, with a star for each Confederate state. The other two mere variants. The battle emblem was flown by the Southern Bray, rather than the official flag, to wake sure there was no confusion with the stars and stripes of thefoion. So those latter day rebels are not flying the Confederate flag at all. But I suppose they won't be disconcerted. They'll probably say - the rebel battle onblen will do just as well.

The New York Longshore strike has ended after an agreement sponsored by the State Fact Finding Board. rarest, the trumpeter swan almost extinct. Efforts have been
made to keep them from dying out altogether, so today Prince
Edward Island was able to make that present - six trumpeter swans.

Actually, the birds axants weren't there. Were
presented - in absentia. The trumpeter swans will be flown
to England later on - likely enough to be a royal exhibit in London $z 00$, an mash in the Serpentine!

Another brilliant meteor sighted in the

Southwest. Which, together with a series of other fireballs, causes a scientist to say - "the most remarkable concentration of meteor-like objects in historic times."

The newest - seen all the way from Los
Angeles to El Pasco, Texas. Described - as a dazzling object with a long tail of blue-white fire. Dr.

Lincoln LaPaz, head of a New Mexico Institute for the study of meteors, says it's the seventh fireball in eleven days.

One was a double meteor, a pair
Ir. LaPaz spotted them - with two bright green trails.
"I've never heard of anything like it," says he.
His belief is that the earth must be passing through an area of space where there's an unusual amount of cosmic debris. Or he thinks that, possibly, the fireballs may be connected with some sort of military test. Which reminds us that the recent
atomic tryouts were held out there - on the Nevada desert. Other scientists, however, say - meteors, just a surprising number of those visitors from outer space.

From a far off island in the New Hebrides, comes a story of ancient terror - with a modern slant. Sailors adrift in an open boat, five Polynesians of the Marshall Islands drifting for three months and a half, they and $\wedge^{\text {attribute their plight to - radioactivity. }}$

On a trading voyage from Kwajalein Island
to Nama Atoll, they were sailing home in a twenty-four foot boat, when a storm hit them - and drove them near Bikini, the Far Pacific atoll where atomic bomb tests were held. That, they say, was the cause of their trouble - their compass went awry. The needle no longer pointed the true direction. This they attribute to radioactive rain water in the vicinity of the atonic testing ground - the atmosphere impregnated with radioactivity, which came down in the raindrops.

With the compass out of gear, their
navigation went wrong. Which, I suppose, would
indicate that Polynesian sailors, going modern with a
compass, have lost their old skill of reading the stars.
