The White Nouse - President Ford today extended his Vietnam amnesty offer - for a period of one month.

This in the face of a sudden rush of applications-with the approach of his original February one deadline.

The President saying: "Many of those who could benefit - from the amnesty program - are apparently "only now learning of its application to their cases."

In a related move - the President also ordered a speed-up today - in the payment of more than three hundred million in veterans insurance benefits.

This in an effort to give a quick boost to consumer spending - and thereby help to spur the economy.

South Vietnam's President Thieu held a rare news conference today - in the Saigon; there telling reporters the three we hundred million in US military aide which the President has asked of Congress - is the least he can get by with.
