Moscow - the Kremlin today accused the U S -  
of repeated "unlawful" violations of Soviet air space;  
including that intrusion last week by an American  
plane bearing two U S generals, which the Kremlin said  
was merely the latest in a whole series of such  
incidents. Moscow adding that the U S "should clearly  
realize" that such actions ~~are~~ can only increase the  
possibility of very dangerous events fraught with the  
most serious aftermaths." Meanwhile, U S Consular  
officials were flying from Moscow to Soviet Armenia;  
there to confer with the captive U S generals, ~~and the~~  
~~an accompanying~~ army major - all three of whom have  
~~previously~~ been held incommunicado.

INDO CHINA

Ground action in southeast Asia <sup>was</sup> marked today by a series of South Vietnamese cross-border missions. These centered chiefly in the so-called "fish-hook" region of Cambodia - where the Saigon troops claim to have killed a hundred and thirty-seven, <sup>as</sup> against government losses ~~to~~ said to ~~have~~ been light.

At the same time, U S intelligence back in Saigon - reporting an apparent switch in enemy policy, <sup>as</sup> reflected in an order ~~to~~ North Vietnamese regulars currently serving in South Vietnam, <sup>an</sup> order telling them they will have to revert, henceforth, to guerrilla tactics - in effect, fending for themselves - becoming self-supporting. Hanoi reportedly ~~says~~ saying this <sup>will be</sup> necessary - because of the outlook for "protracted warfare."

All of which raises the threat of large scale enemy attacks - when the U S has finally withdrawn

*from Vietnam. For the moment though - no question  
but ~~there~~ that there has been a deescalation.*

GREENVILLE

Turning to the domestic front - <sup>- Vice Pres.</sup> ~~Spive~~ Agnew ~~was~~  
~~again holding center stage~~ today <sup>was</sup> Al Greenville, South  
Carolina - pledging that President Nixon will succeed  
sooner or later <sup>^</sup> in placing on the Supreme Court  
a "southern strict constructionist." The Vice President  
saying: "Richard Nixon remains determined - to  
achieve a better ~~ide~~ <sup>id</sup>ological and geographical balance  
on the Supreme Court"; ~~and he~~ <sup>adding</sup> that the President's  
"resolution to achieve that balance - will never waiver."

TEL AVIV

In the Middle East - at Tel Aviv - a rare event. Israel's army intelligence chief - calling his first official press conference. General ~~Abraham~~ Aharon Wariv charging that Egypt - with Russia's help - has installed in the Suez "one of the most advanced missile systems in the world. The General adding that "what has happened here - is in direct ~~contrast~~ contradiction to the present "stand-still" agreement. And he further said: "it would be very difficult for the Israeli Air Force - to compete with these missiles, "very difficult - although not impossible" said he.

UNITED NATIONS FOLLOW TEL AVIV

A few hours later - at the United Nations in  
New York <sup>came</sup> <sup>so-called</sup> the start of another "great debate" dealing  
with the Middle East. First speaker - Egypt's Foreign  
Minister - Mahmoud Riad; who accused ~~the~~ the U S  
of risking a world war - by stepping up its ~~armed~~ <sup>armed</sup> aid  
to Israel; and this even worse - said he, coming at a  
time when Israel has withdrawn from U N peace talks.  
Riad adding that the U N Charter "makes it incumbent  
on the U S to stand by the countries that are victims of  
aggression - and not to support Israel, the aggressor".  
That - from <sup>Cairo's</sup> Mahmoud Riad.
