In Washington -- testimony blaming the ammunition shortage in Korea on a directive issued by General George Marshall, then Secretary of Defense. Lieutenant General Decker, the Army Comptroller ists told a Senate Committee that in September of Nineteen Fifty, General Marshall instructed the armed forces to act on the assumption that the Korean war would be over in a year. Result, there was a slowdown in ammunition production. (But the war still goes on, more than two and a half years later ammunition ran short.

Prime Minister Churchill's cabinet has introduced a budget calling for a cut of British taxes -- together with other measures to ease that British heat austerity. At Frankfurt, Germany, an American court is considering -- a challenge to a duel. An American civilian official hurling the defiance at a U.S.

Army Captain -- all for the love of a lady.

The challenger is Blondell E. Groseclose who hails from Idaho. Hem His post -- that of Assistant Chief historian to the U.S. Twelfth Air Force.

The lady in the case, a German frau - Dr. Margarete Meyer, librarian at an American Service Club.

Groseclose relates that he planned to marry the frau. But last December, he fell ill - - and, while he was in the mx hospital, the frau fell in love with U.S. Army Captain Charles Tarpley, who comes from Tennessee.

That led to the challenge - hurled at the Captain an a U.S.Army club. The document placed before the American court puts the matter in these legal words: "A min challenge to a duel with deadly

weapons. To wit: loaded thirty-eight caliber Smith and Wesson pistols, with the intention that one of the parties shall lose his life."

So -- what to do about it? That'd what puzzles the U.S. court. They're supposed to follow German law - which forbids duelling, and provides a prison sentence. But, the sentence must be served in a "fortress". Not in any common jail for criminals. Which reminds us of the romantic days of the past when an officer, or any person of high rank, would be confined to a "fortress". Same for duelling --an offense of honor.

The trouble is that the U.S. Army in in Germany hasn't cot any "fortress" which would satisfy German law.
