PARIS

Like ships that pass in the night - America's Henry Kissinger and Hanoi's Le Duc Tho passed each other in Moscow. The former - just arriving for talks with Kremlin leaders; the latter - just leaving.

However, Tho later indicated, on arrival at Paris, that he and Kissinger may yet meet again - in another attempt to find a Vietnam peace formula; but more on that - said he -"in a few days time." BIENHOA

Meanwhile, a series of explosions - at

the big Bienhou airbase near Saigon; wounding some forty Americans - as well as destroying or damaging seventy South Vietnamese helicopters. This said to be the worst such attack of the entire war.

To the North - a massive US air strike against suburban Hanoi - knocking out a huge bridge and all but obliterating four military barracks.

At the same time, a broadcast from Viet Cong Radio - later echoed in Paris; a broadcast conceding that "no Communist government " should be forced on South Vietnam but adding - no "U S puppet either. And the thus the only acceptable alternative -- say the Viet Cong - a new **Harp** "Tri- Partite" government. All of which the U S promptly labeled -"nothing new."

VERNON CENTER

On the own campaign trail - George

McGovern travelled today to Vernon Center, Minnesota; the site of farm-fest USA -- and the national plowing contest. The Democratic nominee there pledging there to increase farm income to ninety percent of parity; and quote "stop the take-over of American agriculture by minimum absentee corporations and Fifth Avenue farmers." McGovern also recalling how, as a boy, he saw, hard pressed farmer cry. "I resolved that afternoon" said he - "that there was something terribly wrong with a system - that would do a distants thing like that to a decent, splendid, hard working, honest man, a I resolved if I ever had the chance - I would throw myself into the fight to change that system."
