RED CHINA

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Continuing chaos -- in Red China. Reports reaching Hong Kong telling today of sabetage and riot -- in central Chekiang Province. The one directly opposite Nationalist China's offshore islands -- of Quemoy and Matsu.

Factories and transportation facilties -- reportedly paralyzed by the anti-Maoist uprising. With troops of the Chinese Liberation Army -- finally assigned the job of restoring order. The problem complicated -- we're told -by an outbreak of disease. With the result that spring -7 planting -- vital to Red China -- is running far behind schedule.

A related item -- from Tokyo. Japanese scientists today reporting a major earthquake -- in Red China's heavily-populated Hopei Province. With the epicenter of the quake -- less than a hundred miles from Peking.

Destruction -- as yet -- unknown. The Japanese saying, however -- they fear "considerable damage."

VIET NAM

Last week in Viet Nam -- the deadliest week of the war; according to bitter figures -- bitter for both sides -announced today in Scigon.

Viet Cong losses -- totaling a record two thousand, seven hundred and seventy-four men. About a hundred more than the week before -- previous high-water mark.

During the same period -- the United States losing two hundred and seventy-four men. Surpassing by far -- an A_merican high that had lasted for eighteed months. Ever since that bloody battle for the Ia Drang Valley -- way back in Nineteen-Sity-Five.

South Vietnamese and other forces -- adding two hundred and ten to the Allied death toll. For a sum total representing that the Army calls -- a favorable "kill ratio" of nearly six-to-one. Mute testimony -- to the skill and courage of American fighting men.

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VIETNAM--2

One apparent result -- a sharp tapering off of enemy ground action this week. But no let-up -- in the air war. Marked today by another big American air strike -- against Communist North Vietnam.

Vice President Hubert Humphrey -- in Bonn today for a major address. There challenging repeated Soviet charges -- that West Germany is secretly plotting a new war.

In fact -- said he -- the Western alliance is a strong "guarantee -- to the nations of Eastern Europe; against the threats to their security -- which have flowed from nationalism in the past."

Tonight -- the Vice President flying to Rome. There to confer with Italian officials -- and also to meet with Pope Paul.

ADD BONN

A later report -- from Rome. The Vice President visiting the Rome Opera House tonight -- when a young Italian tried to hit him with a plastic bag of paint. Luckily -- it missed. The culprit quickly apprehanded -- a purple youthful Communist.

PARIS FOLLOW BONN

Speaking of that Western alliance - - final taps today for NATO military headquarters near Paris. The flags of fifteen member nations -- together with a blue NATO banner -- hauled down for the last time. In compliance with orders from French President DeGaulle -- banning NATO forces from French soil.

Now -- it's on to Belgium. Where the same flags will be raised tomorrow -- in another, happier ceremony. Opening brand new NATO headquarters -- at Casteau, near Mons.

KENNER

The death toll from that airliner crash at Kenner, Louisiana - - now set at eighteen. Eight of them -- as you may have heard -- young high school girls from Juda,

The rest -- five crewmen aboard the ship -- a mother and per young son -- and three others who met a flaming death; as the airliner cartwheeled six hundred yeards through a residential community -- before exploding in a ball of fire.

The miracle -- that many more were not killed. One man blown free -- his clothes completely burned off. Another -viewing the wreckage of his house -- asserting: "My God --I don't see how we survived."

BIMINI

Ousted Harlem Congressman Adam Clayton Powell -- in conference with a group of U.S. Negro leaders today at Bimini. Later announcing plans to organize an all-Negro -so-called "third force" political movement.

Too early as yet -- to tell whether it will develop into a real third party -- said Powell. Adding, however, that it will "criss-cross the nation -- to tell the people that tthe future of America depends on the black man."

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SAFETY

All but one of eighteen appeals from automakers -aimed at easing new Federal auto safety standards -rejected flatly today in Washington.

The one exception: An industry appeal against padding requirements -- said to involve extensive redesign of car interiors. The National Traffic Safety Agency -- ordering a public hearing on the matter as soon as possible; at which time -- the automakers will be asked to present proof; that the standard cannot be met -- in time for Nineteen-Sixty-Eight model cars.

Meantime, all other safety standards -- remaining the same as originally announced in January.

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TURBINES

Here's an item -- that comes as a bit of a shock News today that millions of American -- may soon be lighting their homes and running their factories -- on Russian-made electricity.

The story -- from the U.S. Department of the Interior Which is planning to install six new giant turbine generators -- at Grand Coulee Dam in Washington State. Part of an expansion project -- that will more double the dam's electrical output

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As customary -- the turbines will be purchased from the lowest bidder. And Russian officials have already indicated -- they will try to get the

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Why the Russian interest -- in making American electricity? We're told it's apparently part of a Soviet attempt -- to test the sincerity of President Johnson's newly-stated goal. That of building economic bridges -between East and West.

ATHENS

A new Greek political crisis -- is reported today from Athens. Caretaker Premier John Paravaskopoulos -- submitting his resignation to King Constantine. Giving up after four months of futile effort -- trying to arrange for new elections.

The final straw for Paravaskopolous -- loss of support from Greek's Conservative Party. Its members in revolt -against a newly-enacted electoral law amendment; one that would have granted temporary immunity -- to former Premier George Papandreou and his son, Andreas. Both linked with an organization -- said to be plotting to overthrow the King.

Constantine now faced with the difficult task -- of finding a successor to Paravaskopolous -- acceptable to both sides. Meanwhile, police and armed forces placed on the alert -- to guard against possible violence.

LAND'S END

Bombed out and burned out -- but still refusing to sink -- the super-tanker Torrey Canyon finally emerged victorious toda ; after three days of brutal pounding from British warplanes -- off Land's End, England.

The final salvo -- another hundred thousand pounds of bombs: mint at obliterating once source of that sticky mess still polluting British beaches. But apart from a few new holes -- the bombs apparently accomplishing little. With the British Home Office later reporting: "It looks as though -- this is probably the end of bombing operation."

At that -- it's a pyrrhic victory for the stricken vessel. The British saying its huge cargo of crude oil -has all been burned up. It can do -- no more harm.

MALAYSIA

A famous Chinese soothsayer -- enlisted today in the search for American silk tycoon James Thompson; missing nearly a week in the jungles of Malaysia -- nearthe resort of Cameron Highlands.

The medium -- Thong Went, by name -- placing himself in trance; after which he predicted that Thompson would be found -- before nightfall.

However, no such luck. At dusk -- hundreds of would-be rescuers -- forced to call off the search. Thompson still missing -- with little hope that he will ever be found alive.

In the absence of clues -- $\frac{9}{100}$ police now speculating that he was the victim -- of a man-eating tiger.

HOUSTON

At the Manned Space Center in Houston -- another setback today for the fair sex. With first pruning of a list of nearly a thousand applicants -- for six available places in the U.S. scientist-astronaut training program.

At least four women -- known to be among the candidates; vying for a change -- to become America's first "astronette." But of the sixty-nine who survived preliminary screening -- all are men. Final choice of the lucky six -- set of for mid-August.

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LONDON FOLLOW HOUSTON

Reverse side of the coin -- this next from London. Where women musicians were admitted today for the first time -- to the ranks of London's Royal Philharmonic Orchestra.

The move -- breaking an iron-clad ban on women; established by the late Sir Thomas Beecham -- when he founded the orchestra twenty-one years ago. Sir Thomas explaining his aversion to women musicians -- in the following words.

"If they were exceptionally pretty -- they would distract the orchestra" -- said he. Adding: "If they were ugly -- they would distract me."
