And now - with Lowell Thomas en route to Europe on some more high adventure - here's Ned Calmer and the news.

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In Moscow - the Kremlin today announced a record peace-time budget - for Nineteen-Sixty-Six. Including a five per cent boost - in Soviet military spending. The money needed - said Soviet officials - to counter the increased U.S. war effort in Vietnam.

At the Defense Department in Washington - this is considered a rather large increase, inasmuch as the Soviets - are not directly involved in the hostilities in Vietnam.

In any case - American officials are predicting a much larger increase in U.S. military spending, in the next American budget - to be announced in January; a probable increase of more than ten per cent - because we are directly involved in Vietnam.

Defense Secretary McNamara today confirmed widespread reports - of a projected two-thirds cut in the nation's long-range bomber force. This as part of a plan to close or curtail the operations - of a hundred and forty-nine U.Š. military bases. At an estimated annual saving - of four hundred and ten million dollars.

The scheduled reduction - between now and Nineteen Seventy-One - to leave the Strategic Air Command - with just
two hundred and fifty-five of its latest-model B-Fifty-Twos.

A cut made possible - said McNamara - because of the reduced
Soviet bomber threat." Russia at present - said to have fewer
than two hundred intercontinental bombers.

High above earth - Gemini-Seven today completed the first million-and-a-half miles - of its marathon voyage through space. Astronauts Borman and Lovell also getting a "go" for another day - toward a record fourteen days in orbit.

Lovell cheerfully observing - "we're doing pretty good." Clearly - the understatement of the year.

## VIETNAM FOLLOW TRUCE

Meanwhile, the war goes on. American airplanes striking in about fifty sorties today - at entrenched Communist troops about thirty miles south of Da Nang. The Communist force - same one that ambushed and cut down a column of elite Vietnamese Rangers. As they attempted to reach the village of Xuan Thai - under heavy Communist siege.

From Saigon - news today that the Communist Viet

Cong - have offered to observe a twelve-hour cease-fire.

From seven o'clock on Christmas Eve - to seven o'clock on

Christmas morning. Purpose - said Viet Cong radio: To give

South Vietnamese, American and other allied troops - a chance
to attend "Catholic mass."

This apparently in line with similar cease-firesor "pauses" in the war. Offered and observed by the Viet Cong
last Christmas - and also at the time of Vietnam's Lunar
New Year.

In any case, American response - one of diplomatic caution. The State Department adding that a "real Christmas present for the entire world - would be readiness" on the part of the Viet Cong - "to make peace."

The Texas White House today announced - that

McGeorge Bundy resigned his post as National Security Affairs

Adviser. To become President of the Ford Foundation - at a salary of seventy-five thousand dollars a year.

The resignation - to take effect February Twentyeighth. Accepted by the President - "with genuine respect" as he put it.

Bundy's post may be downgraded or eliminated entirely in the new scheme of things. The job of National Security

Affairs Adviser - in many ways that of a sort of "assistant president." And Mr. Johnson convinced - said White House

Press Secretary Bill Moyers - that he must look to his

Cabinet - first and foremost - "for major responsibility."

Here in New York - Chairman William McChesney

Martin of the Federal Reserve Board - struck back today at

critics of the Board's recent decision to raise interest rates.

In particular, at Vice President Humphrey - who said the Board

had failed to coordinate its policies - with those of the rest

of the government.

The action raising interest rates - said Martin taken not to hamper but to help Administration efforts - to
keep the economy on an even keel. The Board - he went on would always seek to coordinate its own moves - with those
of other government agencies.

"But" - said Martin - "we cannot take monetary

measures that are contrary to our best judgment - or refrain

from taking measures that we consider necessary."

For the first time in eleven years - the government of India today ordered food rationing in New Delhi. The capital city - with a population of nearly three million people - hard hit by a shortage of grains. Indeed, the vast subcontinent of Hindustan - now virtually dependent on hugh quantities of American wheat - to avert a disastrous famine.

The principal reason - a nationwide drought - that has decimated crops over the last three months. There were with the latest setback - a cold wave in Eastern India. That has killed additional crops - and frozen large numbers of cattle and fowl.

At Salisbury, Premier Ian Smith of Rhodesia - loday ordered the deportation of all alien workers - now employed in that rebellious colony. The move necessary - said Smith to creat new jobs for Rhodesians left without work - as a result of British economic sanctions. The order expected toaffect - about half-a-million Black Africans.

Smith also ordered his own economic sanctions against the neighboring countries of Malawi and Zambia. Both
of which - have close trade ties with Rhodesia. The two
nations told that for any future purchase of Rhodesian goods
- they must make pre-payment in American dollars or West
European currency.

British pounds sterling - the traditional medium of exchange - now virtually useless to Rhodesia.

The bitter end of a love affair - reported today from Tucson, Arizona. Final denouement - in theform of a will - filed in behalf of a Tucson woman.

The will containing a bequest as follows: "To my husband" - said the woman - "I bequeath thirty pieces of silver - in the form of thirty United States dimes."

Ah, but this final act of revenge - all in vain. You see - her husband died first.

Tens of thousands of Russians - staged a series of demonstrations today in the streets of Moscow. In apparent protest - against American policies in Vietnam.

According to the Kremlin - about a quarter-of-amillion Russians in all - taking part in the protest. A
handful of the demonstrators - attempting to deliver an
anti-American petition to the U.S. Embassy. However,
strong police precautions - barring any violence.

The demonstrations - part of a rising tide of Russian protest against the United States. Coinciding with Soviet

Premier Rosygin's bitterest attack to date - on American foreign policy. One in which he accused American soldiers - of wantonly killing women and children in Vietnam.

American reaction - from State Department Press

Officer Robert McCloskey. Kosygin guilty - said he - of

"obvious extreme distortions and one-sides description of

events taking place in the world."

At the Vatican - Pope Paul wrote "finis" today - to the Ecumenical Council. By means of an outdoor ceremony in St. Peter's Square - replete with medieval pomp and pageantry.

The public invited - and thousands showed up.

Nevertheless, the Pope's last remarks - addressed directly to Council delegates. Some twenty-three hundred prelates from more than eighty nations.

Said the Pope: "The Council is now finally closed this immense and extraordinary assembly now ends." His
closing salute - he went on - hopefully "like the ring of a
bell reaching heaven."

The Pope's final blessing: "Ite in pace." Go in peace.
