London, in all it's long years - has rarely seen a crowd like the one today. A hundred-thousand people - jammed in Traflager Square, for a demonstration of protest - against atomic weapons.

Previously, there had been similar manifestations. Crowds marching from the British Nuclear Research Station at Aldermaston, fifty-three miles from London. Trudging their way - to the metrapolis. Last year, for example, the crowd in Traflagar Square numbered about six-thousand.

Today, ten-thousand set-out from Aldermaston on a four-day hike. This time joined by thousands more
until there were forty-thousand in a column seven miles
long. People of every sort - beatniks with beards,
