## CAPITOL HILL

President Nixon sent to Capitol Hill today part one of

his State of the Union address; an address he plans to present

this year - in a series of written messages.

The President renewing his call for a leaner government

- one that places more reliance on the individual. Adding

that the first part of this decade has been good. "Our job

now," he continued - "all of us together - is to make

Nineteen-Seventy-Three and the years to come even better."

The President also extended a tentative olive branch to members of Congress. "As President" - said he - "I
recognize that I cannot do this job alone." "My sincere
hope - he went on - is that the executive and legislative
branches can work together in this great undertaking; in a
positive spirit of mutual respect and cooperation."

In Vietnam - after five days of seemingly
interminable delay - the leaders of a four part commission
representing all the combatants met for the first time today
in Saigon. They quickly agreed to hold their first working
session on Sunday; with number one on the agenda - the
release of American prisoners of war.

The U.S. was also applying pressure to both the North and South Vietnamese - to renew their stand-down orders to troops in the field; an effort to stop the local, sparadic fighting that still persists in many places despite the signing of the formal cease fire agreement.

South Vietnam's President Thieu was lashing out today at the Communist members of the International Cease Fire Commission, accusing Poland and Hungary of dragging their feet; adding that the Communists must show more good will toward recognizing cease fire violations.

For the first time in history - the Nobel foundation strips away its cloak of secrecy in Oslo today - announcing the names of some of those - who are being considered for this year's Nobel Peace Prize.

At the head of the list - at least, as far as the U.S.

is concerned - President Nixon - for his trips to Moscow

and Peking - for his efforts to limit the proliferation of

nuclear weapons. Others on the list including President Tito

of Yugoslavia and Brazil's Roman Catholic Bishop - Dom

Helder Camara.

First - Oklahoma - now Montana. The latter becoming the second state this week - to reject that proposed constitutional amendment providing equal rights for women.

The Montana Senate turning it down by a single vote after two hours of impassioned debate.

One of the measures chief opponents - Democrate John McDonald - who said at one point: "If Jesus wanted people to be equal he would have had six men Apostles and six women."

In Northern Ireland - the outlawed IRA was torn by dissention today. Its moderate "official" wing - accusing Militant Provisionals of declaring open war on the protestant Ulster Defense Association. Adding that this can only lead - to "a savage massacre of innocent people." Therefore urging Roman Catholics to ban together in denying sanctuary to bombers, and quote, "murder squads."

Nevertheless, another terrorist attack - just a few hours later. Two IR A gunmen - apparently Provisionals invading a Belfast paint store; lining up a number of employees demanding to know which of them were Protestants. A police spokesman saying: "They then selected a Protestant man - and shot him dead through the head." Adding that this could be - the first shot in an ITA sectarian war."

The U.S. Unemployment rate - down again last month ending up at an even five percent - according to figures announced today; thereby, matching the President's interim goal for easing unemployment. Chairman Herbert Stein of the President's councilof Economic Advisors - observing that this further supports the picture of a strong labor market.

The White House again - eight members of President

Nixon's newly revised cabinet were sworn in today in a mass

ceremony. These including Defense Secretary Elliott

Richardson, Commerce Secretary Frederick Dent, Labor

Secretary Peter Brennan - Housing and Urban Development

Secretary James Lynn - and Transportation Secretary Claude

Brinegar; also, U N Ambassador John Scali, special counselon

Anne Armstrong, and Director Roy Ash of the Office of

Management and Budget.

Some are Republicans and some are Democrats, said

the President." But they can best be described - one and all"

- said he - "as a peace cabinet."

John Connolly of Texas - a visitor in Washington
this week conferring with President Nixon - also, taping a
TV interview.

One of the first questions - about the report that

President Nixon has tabbed Connolly as his first choice for

President in Seventy-Six. Connolly replying: "I think I'd

better leave town - something like this pops up every

time I come to Washington. And then - in a more serious

vein - he added: "I don't really believe the President said

that - I can't believe he would be making a statement on his

choice of a Republican nominee only sixty days after his own

re-election."

Later on though, Connolly observing that he "might well" switch one day - from Democrat f to Republican.

But he added quickly: "If I do it - it's not going to be on the basis of seeking the Presidential nomination - it'll be based on which party I can be most comfortable in."

Elsewhere in Washington - former Senator Daniel

Brewster of Maryland was sentenced today to two to six

years in prison. This - as you know, for accepting

bribes. Brewster's co-defendant Lobbyist Cyrus Anderson

similarly sentenced to four-and-a-half years.

From the National Center for Disease Control in Atlanta a report today that London Flu is still sweeping
the country and thus a full scale epidemic forthe fourth
straight week.

Worse yet - London Flu and related illnesses - are said to have claimed more than a thousand lives. Last week alone an increase of more than three hundred over normal.

A bizarre aerial chase is reported today - from the skies high and low, over the San Fernando Valley in Southern California. A small single engine plane - allegedly buzzing a school whereupon a police helicopter was sent up to investigate - and was nearly rammed. A second, faster helicopter then joining the chase which continued for more than two hundred miles at altitudes ranging from a thousand to fifty feet. The pursuers reportedly forced to take evasive action time and again - to keep from being hit.

In the end though - the plane was finally forced down at Whiteman Air Park. Its pilot Paul Harsch - age thirty promptly charged with assault with a deadly weapon. Said weapon his airplane, which he had stolen, by the way
