A rescue team was ordered - into the area. But vy the time they arrived - the two survivors had been picked up. Sergeant Fannin, managing to stagger out of the quonset hut - and flag a plane flying over the oil site.

This could be a way out of the impasse - if only the Russians would drop their propaganda about East German sovereignty. Something that they know, and we know - is a myth concocted in Moscow.
