The United States has intercepted a Soviet broadcast indicating that the Russians are going ahead with their nuclear explosions. This announcement comes from the State Department - which quotes Radio Moscow. The Soviet broadcast isn't clear about whether the Russians have already broken the ban on atomic testing - or me are about to do so.

Mr. Kennedy says that while he's not too hopeful - about doing business with Khrushchev, he is always ready - to try...beginning with an allied conference in Washington - Britain, France, West Germany and the United States.

President Kennedy defended his handling of Berlin - from criticism by Richard Mixon, the statement by the former Vice President that there was nothing to gain from sending reinforcements to Berlin. The Kennedy answer that it's not a question of holding Berlin against the Soviet Army but of showing Khrushchev that we mean business - when we say that we will stay in Berlin.
