The Premier and several other Ministers, wounded - when hand grenades were thrown into a garden party they were attending.

It isn't clear what this outbreak of terporism signifies. The news - held up until today.

News reaching India gives an ugly background for the revolts in Tibet. People of that Himalayan mmi realm - in clashes with occupation forces of the Chinese Reds. Because - of great floods; the mighty river system of the Brahmaputra, in a series of inundations.

We've heard how the Tibetans attribute the deluge to the anger of the gods, because the Dalai Lama was taken from his capital, that fabuous potela at Lhasa. The Communists - exhibiting the spiritual ruler of Tibet at a Red political circus in Peking.

Now, however, there seems to be a more practical factor in the outbreak of trouble. Reports reaching India tell of Communists up to their usual tricks.

The disturbances are centered around Qyantse,
Tibet's number two city. Gyantse - ravaged badly by the
floods.

But wh the story goes back - before the deluge

Earlier in the summer, there was discontent in that area of Gyantse, with outbreaks of revolt. Because of Taxes.

The Reds - imposing large levies, and collecting the taxes ruthlessly. Tibetans resisting - and the Communists found a way to punish them.

When the flood crisis came, there was food relief in other parts. But the Reds cut off all supplies for Gyantse. Flood victims there - consigned to starvation.

Femiliar tactics of the Communists - and that, we hear, is one reason for the new outbreak of rebellion in Tibet

## FOLLOW TIBET

A later dispatch states that, in the Western part of Tibet, Chinese anti-Communists have joined with Tibetans - in a move against the Reds. The Chinese-Tibetan border, in those parts, is described as - vague. With Chinese and Tibetan populations - mixed. Now - joining forces against the Communists.

Here's an incident of sinister fascination - as a possible clue in the grimmest mystery of our time. What went on in the Kremlin, at the time of the death of Stalin?

"The only clue, possibly bearing on the state of Stalin's mind, was noted by Mr. Menon. Stalin doodled on a pad of paper, throughout the interview - an old habit of his. Mr. Menon noticed that he was drawing - wolves. One wolf - after another.

"Stalin apparently," writes the Times correspondent,

"had wolves on his mind. Because, presently, he was saying 
that Russian peasants knew how to deal with wolves. They shot

them and exterminated them."

"It might," Harrison Salisbury concludes, "have been a tiny visible evidence of a mind that, behind a facade of seeming brightness and normality, was only too preoccupied with the subject of eliminating wolves."

So that's one clue in a theory - that the Kremlin gang may have put Stalin out of the way, to save themselves.
